Historic Township SAA Meeting Follow Up

The recently held meeting on the Historic Township Special Area Assessment (SAA) was illuminating. Many thoughtful questions and comments were expressed by those in attendance. I especially appreciated the kindly gentleman who approached me before the meeting asking that I refer to the area as the Historic Township rather than the Old Township. I like his description so much better for indeed that's what it is. It still has the feel of a small rural town with an informal appearance that appeals to many. A few stated that they moved here specifically because of that and want it to remain that way.

Some residents claimed that even the significantly smaller assessment being proposed poses a financial hardship for them. That is a real concern. Should the SAA be approved by the residents and created by the City Council it's perhaps helpful to note that the first payment will not be due until late 2011 so there is some time to prepare. Roosevelt Gubler who's lived here most of his life reminded us that it was community spirit that built the original township. Neighbors banded together to build early roads and water lines. He paid for his street to be oiled out of his own pocket when others couldn't afford to help. Although it's not practical for us to collectively man shovels and machines to



complete a project of this size I believe that the community spirit he referred to is still alive and well. I would hope that we could find ways to ease the burden of those who would be hardest hit should the project move forward.



Others voiced concern over the lien that will be placed on their property at the creation of the SAA. As with any other lien a future buyer or lender may require that this lien be deducted from the proceeds of the sale of an affected property at closing. It is expected that the value added by the improvements and the additional frontage made available by the City will more than compensate the seller. Concerning the City's ability to foreclose on ones property for delinquent or non-payment, although the City does have the legal right to foreclose, as a practical matter it has never done so in the past.



Those who spoke in favor of the SAA brought up the deteriorating roads, flooding and the "safe sidewalks" issue that got the ball rolling in the first place. Troy Nelson who originally opposed the improvements but has since installed them in front of his own property said that it's proven to be a



good thing for him and that he favors the project moving ahead. A timely downpour a couple of days after the meeting reminded us yet again how messy things get when the storm water flows uncontrolled down the township streets and the maintenance issues that result.



It was explained in the meeting that the engineering work in process is necessary whether the improvements are completed now or at some time in the future as parcels are subdivided or neighbors decide to move forward on their own as has already happened on a few streets. A comprehensive plan will insure that the pieces ultimately fit together. It in no way indicates that the City will move forward regardless of the outcome of the current SAA process. In fact quite the opposite is true.

Should the SAA be defeated or the City Council chooses not to create it, our request for Federal funds and commitment to the Build America Bond will be withdrawn and the proposed project will die. The inference that the City should or will eventually complete the improvements without the support of the township residents is highly unlikely. That would require residents in other parts of the City who have already paid for those improvements in their own neighborhoods when they purchased their home or building lot to participate equally with the township residents to complete theirs. That is not a fair request since they would not derive an equivalent benefit.



I also think it's important for you the residents of the Historic Township to understand that this effort was started because several of you approached the City asking us to find a way to provide adequate drainage, better roads, and a safe place for your children to walk. In response to that request I came up with the storm water approach to the project and lobbied our Federal legislators for support. The City Council then agreed to commit City resources to assist you in completing the necessary improvements in your neighborhoods at a reasonable cost to you. In reality the City has been trying to help. It never intended to force something upon you that you do not want.



July is the month in which protests to the SAA must be filed. The details regarding those protests will be included in the notices being sent to all affected property owners. Protests will be weighted according to the individual assessments they represent. If the protests collectively exceed or perhaps even approach 51% of the overall assessment the SAA will fail. The City Council could then either modify the SAA and re-introduce it or abandon it altogether.

Regardless of the outcome of the SAA the storm water issue will not go away. It will ultimately need to be dealt with by you as township residents and by the City alike. Any alternative solution like building a detention basin would leave the Historic Township in its present condition indefinitely. Apparently that would be good news for some and bad news for others. In any event the future of the Historic Township lies in your hands as its residents where it belongs. The City will be satisfied with whatever you decide.

Fire Hydrant Testing

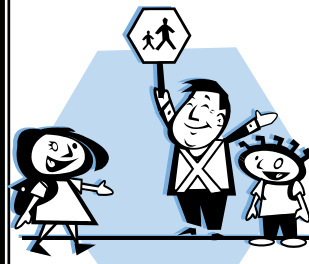
To ensure good management of the fire hydrants here in Ivins City, fire crews have a yearly assignment of checking the different pressures and flows of each hydrant. With over 500 fire hydrants throughout the city, crew members try to complete a number of hydrants each day. As the fire crews test hydrants, every now and then they have a hydrant that has substantial overgrowth from plants, shrubs and trees that prohibits the crew's ability to test the hydrants. The growth could also prevent the ability to fight a fire.



To help out the crews in testing and to ensure our ability to fight a fire, we would like to ask all home owners to keep the growth of vegetation around hydrants to a minimum. We are asking for a three-foot clearing around the hydrant with no vegetation. This clearance would assist the crew's effort in having adequate space to properly work. We hope that each home owner will consider helping us ensure the safety of our community.

FACTS Concerning Historic Township Improvements

- This effort was initiated by Historic Township residents appealing to the City to solve flooding and pedestrian safety problems.
- Curb & gutter and paved roads are the recommended but not the only solution available to the City for the township area storm water problem. Other more economical solutions will not include the township area road improvements however.
- The anticipated cost for the proposed improvements is \$5.0 million.
- The costs are apportioned as follows: Ivins City \$2.0 million, Federal Government \$1.5 million, Historic Township residents \$1.5 million.
- The City portion will be funded using a sales tax supported Build America Bond.
- Property taxes will not be raised to support the Build America Bond because bonds are being retired prior to this new debt obligation.
- The Federal portion will come through earmarks being sought through the offices of Senator Bennett and Congressman Matheson.
- The township residents' portion will be funded through the creation of a Special Area Assessment or SAA.
- The SAA assessment for each property owner is the average of an assessment based on their property area and an assessment based on their property frontage on public streets.

- The assessment will appear as a lien on the affected properties and can be paid in a lump sum or in monthly payments over twenty years.
- The first payment will not come due until the project is completed most likely late in 2011.
- Like any lien it may be required to be paid off while closing on the sale of a subject property.
- Ivins City has never foreclosed on an SID lien.
- Township area residents will be given a specified period of time to protest the SAA.
- Protests are weighted according to the size of the individual assessment as a percentage of the overall assessment.
- A failure to protest the SAA is counted as support for it.
- Should the SAA fail based on 51% of the assessments being protested the project will NOT move forward.
- Should the SAA pass the City Council is required to hold a public hearing on the SAA.
- The City Council will then decide whether or not to move forward with the creation of the SAA. It may also revise the SAA and re-notice it whether or not the SAA passes.
- The engineering work currently being done does NOT mean that the project will be done against the will of the Historic Township residents. The design work is necessary for the eventual tying together of improved sections of the Historic Township.
- Should the SAA fail property owners who subdivide are currently required to pay for the road improvements adjacent to their property.
- Should the SAA fail individual property owners or groups of property owners together may install the road improvements on their own with limited City participation as funds are available.
- Should the project proceed the unused right of way will be made available to the adjacent property owners as additional frontage.

Conservation Corner

So.... Did you try last month's Tip #1? It could have saved you lots on your air conditioning cost! Let's remember: "Tip #1: During cool early mornings, open windows or doors to allow the cool air to enter the home. If the air is very still, I will use a fan to bring the cool air into the house. I usually do this about 5 or 6 am and close them about 7:30 or 8 am or before leaving for work."

This last month I often lowered the inside house temperature by 4-6 degrees. When there was no breeze, placing a fan at the door really helped draw the cool air into the house. Then, make sure to close the doors and windows to keep your home cool.



As we come to the third in this series, the theme is to "get personal". What I mean by this is that your house does not feel hot or cold.... you do. Create your own microclimate. Each person has their own sense of comfort concerning temperature. The best way to control this is by what you wear. Another is to focus on the area around you. Use fans, such as ceiling and floor fans, to circulate the air around you. And you do not need to run fans in areas or rooms that you are not in since this uses electricity with no personal benefit.

Reduce sources of heat (see the last issue). Turn off lights when not needed. Use shades to keep out the summer sun. Your body is a major source of heat. Refresh yourself with cool drinks, fruit, and other items from the refrigerator or freezer (a dish of ice cream or popsicle). During my summers as a student at Caltech, a friend and I would often buy a watermelon. After a good swim at the campus pool, we would sit on the grass, break open the watermelon and savor its rich flavor.



Here are some pointers:

Tip #1: Dress appropriately for the hot summer days. Be sure to wear a hat and put on suntan lotion with high SPF (sun protection factor) if you are out for a while in the sun.



Tip #2: Recharge your personal "coolness index". Go swimming. Enjoy a weekend or day trip to the mountains. Being new to Utah, we have been exploring the Pine Mountains, Cedar Breaks (saw lots of snow over Memorial Day weekend), Duck Creek, Bryce and several other "cool" places.

Tip #3: Refresh yourself with cold drinks. On trips, I take along a cooler with cold water bottles including some which I have frozen (which keep the drinks and snacks cool and are a great source of icy cold water on the way home). I have also made popsicles with orange and other juices.



Tip #4: Make sure your air conditioner (A/C) is working. This last month I have encountered several A/C units with problems. Due to the low humidity in this area, swamp coolers are also a great, low cost alternative. Again, make sure that they are properly working (float valves, pumps, etc.).

Tip #5: For those at work or who have commercial utility accounts, I am typically saving 30-60% on their utility bills due to issues with the added demand charges for the utilities.



Tip #6: I have been involved world-wide in the development of photovoltaics (PV: sunlight to electricity) for over 35 years. PV systems have improved and the costs have dropped. I can help you with cost-effective, properly designed and reliable systems for your home or business.
