Old Township Improvements If Not Now, When?

The EPA required Ivins City under the Federal Clean Water and Water Quality Acts to develop a comprehensive storm water management plan and to systematically implement it. Ours was updated in 2009 to incorporate their more rigid Phase II requirements. In part it obligates the City to minimize the volume of contaminants discharged into the Santa Clara River. Systems and procedures to accomplish that objective were identified and are currently being implemented. The systems translated into projects that are outlined in our Storm Water Capital Facilities Plan that was adopted in 2006. Several of them have already been completed including enlarging the Tuacahn Wash culverts and installing storm drain systems in Central Ivins, on 600 West and on East Center Street. We are currently paying for those projects through the storm water fee charged on our monthly utility bills.

One particularly difficult area in which to manage storm water contamination is the old township extending from 200 East to 200 West and from 400 North to 200 South because of the poorly graded roads, wide dirt shoulders and absence of curb & gutter and storm drains. The prescribed solution is for curb & gutter and paved roads to be built to carry storm water cleanly to existing storm drains below Center Street. Looking at these improvements as a storm water project rather than a road project makes a world of difference. It becomes important to the City as a whole to eventually complete it since the City will ultimately be subject to EPA enforcement and fines. In addition, when categorized as an unfunded Federal mandate the City may qualify for Federal assistance where as a road project we do not.

The question then becomes “when” not “if” these improvements will be done and there are some compelling reasons to do them now. First, four years ago the engineers’ estimate to complete the project including sidewalks was \$7.5 million dollars. Today it is about \$5.0 million dollars. Second, bonding interest rates under the Build America Bond program are the lowest available to us in years. Third, I have met with Senator Bennett and Congressman Matheson and they support our request for Federal assistance. The Ivins Old Township Project appears on both of their funding lists for this year. Fourth, our Engineering, Public Works and Administrative Staffs are in a good position to oversee or perhaps even manage a project of this scale. And last but not least, we have a number of concrete contractors and finishers who reside in Ivins for whom work has been scarce and we’re determined to find a way to involve them in this project.

The proposed funding will consist of three components. The City will fund approximately \$2.0 million through a sales tax supported Build America Bond. The payments will be made using monies made available through the retirement of two existing bonds so no additional taxes or fees will be sought from Ivins residents outside the old township. The Federal Government will hopefully provide \$1.5 million dollars which is the funding amount Congressman Matheson is trying to secure for us. Senator Bennett is seeking half that amount but it is our belief that between them with anticipated additional support from Senator Hatch we will receive what we need. That leaves a balance of approximately \$1.5 million dollars to be assessed to the residents of the old township through a Special Assessment Area or SAA. A follow up article by our Staff in this newsletter explains how the SAA works and the formula being used to assess it.



On April 1st the City Council voted to move ahead with the engineering work for the project and a contract was awarded to Rosenberg and Associates to complete that phase. That explains the activity and markings you have seen in that area of town. By September we hope to put the

project out to bid and of course the actual costs will ultimately determine its feasibility. Nothing that has been or that is currently being done should be taken to mean that the project will automatically go forward as proposed. The SAA must first be approved by property owners in the Old Township, the Federal funding must be committed, and the City Council must yet approve it. If any of these fail to materialize we will be forced to abandon the project or start over using a different approach.

In the meantime we will be holding a meeting on Thursday evening June 10th at 7:00 P.M. in the Red Mountain Elementary gymnasium as a follow up to the one held two months ago. In it we will discuss the project, the bond and the SAA in more detail, explore design preferences with the old township residents and answer questions. All interested residents are welcome to attend but only the old township residents will receive written invitations. For those who cannot attend, the meeting will be broadcast on the Community Education Channel 22 for Baja Cable subscribers.

I believe that we have a great opportunity before us. We stand to gain three valuable benefits for the discounted price of one. In the process of implementing an important part of our Storm Water Management Plan we will obtain long overdue improvements in the old township that will not only reduce flooding and sedimentary discharge into our storm water system but will also enhance pedestrian safety and the appearance of our roads in that area. And as an added bonus we will avoid a monumental long term road maintenance project that will free resources to be used to maintain deteriorating roads elsewhere in the City. By contrast no one knows what the bid or bonding environments will be like in the future when this project may become mandatory. I can't imagine either one improving. So I pose the question "If not now, when?"

Conservation Corner

Oops.... Last issue I forgot to mention daylight savings time and the need to update the clock on your programmable thermostats. Please check these. Otherwise you will be responding to Utah's climate one hour later.



This is the second in the series. With summer approaching, I would like to discuss some principles about solar heat gain which will help you reduce your air conditioning costs and save you some money. Last summer on a 90°F day, I measured the road surfaces above 150°F. Hot! In contrast, the coolest surfaces I found were green grass, in the 70's. What I was surprised by was that the sun-exposed light tan colored stucco walls, typical of this area, were 135°F. This effect of solar heat gain was reinforced a few weeks ago, when I was in Ivins on a nice late Spring morning. The air temperature was a pleasant 70°F. Due to the solar heat gain, the roof temperature and the brick outside wall temperatures were already 120°F, 50° higher than the air temperature, forcing the air conditioner to work much harder. The higher temperatures are due to the absorption

of the sun's energy. Darker colors absorb. Lighter colors reflect. Stop by a car dealer during the summer, for example, and for different color cars, carefully touch their surfaces. You might be surprised at the differences in temperatures. Some are really hot. Unfortunately, it is not easy to change the nature and color of your roof or your exterior walls.

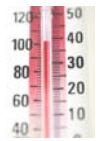
Here are some pointers:

Tip #1: During cool early mornings, open windows or doors to allow the cool air to enter the home. If the air is very still, I will use a fan to bring the cool air into the house. I usually do this about 5 or 6 am and close them about 7:30 or 8 am or before leaving for work.



Tip #2: Turn off sources of heat inside the home. Use indirect sunlight rather than turning on lights. If you are not using your computer, printers, TV, etc., turn them off. This also saves on the electric bill.

Tip #3: Reduce the sunlight entering your home through south-facing windows. Add shades or blinds. Close them during the hot part of the day. For example, we have white blinds which reflect quite well. I have also used mirror mylar and solar film to reduce solar heat gain. You can also add solar awnings.



Tip #4: Check for open windows, improperly sealed doors, or other ways hot air can enter the house. For example, I found the bottom of my door to the garage to let in hot air. I added weather stripping which is an inexpensive solution.

Tip #5: Make sure the fins of your outside air conditioner condensers are not clogged by the famous red dust. This lowers its efficiency.



Tip #6: Check the thermal insulation in your attic. I target about R30. You want to keep the heat out in the summer and in during the winter. Rebates are available; for example, contact Questar. If your attic gets really hot, consider a thermostatically controlled attic fan to remove the hot air build-up.

Tip #7: Landscaping can make a big difference on your home microclimate such as shade trees on the south and west side or well placed grass and shrubs. Consult a qualified landscaper familiar with southwest landscaping.

This article is intended to provide additional information regarding the proposed Old Township improvements and the Special Assessment Area (SAA) process. It is difficult to address all the details in writing and you are invited to get any questions you may have answered individually – e-mails and phone numbers are listed below. This is an important project for the Old Township and Ivins City as a whole and we will spend as much time as necessary providing detailed information.

INFORMATIONAL MEETING

You are invited to attend a meeting on June 10, 2010 at 7:00 p.m. at the Red Mountain Elementary school to address any questions you may have or obtain additional information.



PROCEDURAL SUMMARY FOR DESIGNATING AN ASSESSMENT AREA

An "Assessment Area," sometimes referred to as a "Special Assessment Area," is an area designated by the city for the purpose of financing, by way of an assessment, certain costs of improvements that benefit property within the designated area. Prior to passage of the "Assessment Area Act" (the "Act") in 2009, such designated area had been known as a "Special Improvement District."



An Assessment Area is created by the city adopting what is known in the Act as a "designation resolution" or "designation ordinance." Prior to the city adopting such a resolution or ordinance, the city must give notice as provided in Section 11-42-202 of the Act, receive and consider all protests filed under Section 11-42-203 of the Act, and hold a public hearing as provided in Section 11-42-204 of the Act.

Notice

The required notice will include such things as a description of the improvements to be provided within the Assessment Area, the estimated cost of the improvements, a statement that the city proposes to levy an assessment on property within the Assessment Area benefited by the improvements, a description of the method by which such assessments are calculated and levied, and the time in which protests must be filed. The required notice will also state the date, time and place of the public hearing and may contain other information that the city considers appropriate.



The required notice will be published in The Spectrum newspaper once a week for four consecutive weeks, published on the Utah Public Notice Website for four weeks before the deadline for filing protests, and will be mailed to each owner of property to be assessed within the proposed Assessment Area.



Protests

An owner of property that is proposed to be assessed within an Assessment Area may file a written protest against the designation of the Assessment Area, the inclusion of the owner's property in the proposed Assessment Area, the proposed improvements to be constructed, or any other aspect of the proposed designation of an Assessment Area. In order to be considered, such protests must be filed with the city within the time specified in the notice and must describe, or otherwise identify, the property owned by the person filing the protest.

Public Hearing

On the date and at the time and place specified in the notice, the City Council will hold a public hearing to hear all objections to the designation of the proposed Assessment Area or the improvements proposed to be provided in the Assessment Area, to hear all persons desiring to be heard, and to consider all protests filed under Section 11-42-203 of the Act.



Adoption of Resolution or Ordinance

After holding a public hearing and considering all protests filed with the City, the City Council shall adopt a resolution or ordinance either: 1) abandoning the proposal to designate an Assessment Area; or 2) designating an Assessment Area as described in the notice, or with changes thereto made following the public hearing. If adequate protests (more than 50%) have been filed, then the City Council may not designate an Assessment Area as described in the notice. If, on the other hand, a designation resolution or ordinance is adopted by the City Council, it will be recorded with the Washington County Recorder along with a notice thereof stating that the city has designated an assessment area and lists, by legal description and tax identification number, the property proposed to be assessed. After the adoption of the designation resolution or ordinance, the City may then begin providing the specified improvements.

HOW THE ASSESSMENT IS CALCULATED

From the start, one of the questions that has been grappled with in setting up this SAA is what method should be used in determining the proportionate share of the project for each property owner with the intent of making it as fair as possible. There is no doubt that no matter the method, there will be those that would prefer a different method that might reduce their own cost. State law allows many different methods of assessment which may include "frontage, area, taxable value, fair market value, lot, number of connections, equivalent residential unit, or any combination of these methods." (Utah Code Section 11-42-102.6)

Originally, the City proposed assessing by area. However, many residents felt that frontage was a better method and should be considered. The City evaluated the impacts of each method and produced a map showing the potential cost to each lot for each method. This map is available at the City offices. The advantage of assessing by area is that corner lots are alleviated from carrying a potentially double or triple the cost of its neighboring lot, yet intuitively it is unlikely that the lot would receive a proportionate property value increase. However,

others have argued that having a corner lot provides an advantage to the lot in terms of additional access and the convenience for a future lot split.

The City Council has looked closely at the two methods and the impacts on the typical lot configurations. Based on the analysis it became apparent that a mix of the two methods would be a fair compromise and most likely to satisfy the majority of the concerns.

APPROACH TO ENGINEERING OLD TOWNSHIP IMPROVEMENTS

On April 1, 2010 the City Council approved the expenditure to contract with Rosenberg and Associates to start the engineering process for the curbs, gutters, sidewalks and new asphalt paved streets for the Ivins Old Township Improvements Project. Many may have noticed that Rosenberg has already begun surveying the project. The surveying will ensure that all improvements are correctly located with accuracy and precision with a best possible understanding of the natural grades and potential obstacles. Many others will have noticed that utilities have been paint-marked for the excavation of test pits and soil borings so that geotechnical engineers can collect soil samples for testing and analyses. These soil samples will ensure that the pavement designs will be adequate for the expected traffic conditions for a long lasting product. These are the first two critical engineering steps in designing a large project of this type.



The next steps will be to identify the drainage constraints and start determining the best street profiles for each of the 12 miles of streets that are located in the area. The street profile design is constrained by drainage considerations and traffic design. A carefully designed profile will provide a smoother and more comfortable ride yet better control drainage so that flood waters are safely conveyed to drainage facilities. The grading for drainage will be most critical for the east-west streets which will see the most significant changes to the existing street grades. As a result, a few driveways may need to be modified to further ensure that street drainage remains in the streets.

There are some elements of the design that are purely aesthetic, most particularly is the issue of whether the sidewalks should meander or go parallel with the street and whether a highback curb (vertical curb face) or a modified curb (slanted curb face) should be used on the project. The City hopes to receive valuable feedback from the affected property owners at the next public meeting on June 10th before a decision is made on these issues.

The engineering design is expected to be completed by Rosenberg in August. Once the design is complete and all funding is in place, the City will begin the bidding and award process, which can require two to three months, to select a contractor(s). With the contractor(s) selected and a contract(s) in place,

construction will begin and is expected to last 6 to 9 months. For the duration of the construction, it will be necessary for the contractor to constantly maintain home access except in the few instances when it may be necessary to shutdown road segments for short periods of time, typically access shouldn't be closed more than 24 hours. It may even be possible in some of the areas with wide right-of-way for access to be maintained without exception even during actual installations. Certainly, however, residents should expect some inconveniences during construction.

Ivins Parks & Recreation

Ready or not, summer is here! And this month we have a long list of items that we would like you to be aware of that might help make your summer more fun, safe, less stressful.



Now is the season that people like to use the pavilions in the parks. If you are planning to use one of the pavilions for an activity it is a very good idea to plan ahead and come into the Parks & Recreation office and reserve it. There is no charge, but it will secure the use of the pavilion for your group (when there is no reservation for a pavilion they can be used on a first come first served basis).

Recently we have had many unsupervised children in the parks after school, and though we love that they are there, sometimes when there are large groups of young people that are not supervised and playing together they tend to do things that they would not do normally. Some of the things they do are dangerous like climbing on the roof tops of the building and on the Founders Monument, playing on the recycle binnies and taking bottles out of the bins and breaking them in the park. These things are not just dangerous, they also cause damage to park facilities and can pose a hazard to other park users. Please remind your children to help keep our parks clean and safe.

We have also had reports of some problems with dog feces not being picked up on the Toe (Dike) Trail. Please be considerate of others who use the trail and pick up after your dogs. There are dog waste bags provided at the trail head at the top of 200 East and at the Animal Shelter at the top of 200 West. There will soon be a dog waste bag dispenser and a trash can at the top of 100 East right on the trail. Please use these bags and pick up after your pet. Also please keep in mind that your dogs and cats must be on a leash and under the control of a person at all times when you are within Ivins City boundaries. There are only two places where you are allowed to have your dog or cat off leash. One is at the dog park the other is in your fenced yard.

As you are out in the parks and on the trails please let us know if you discover any problems and report them as soon as you can so that we can get them taken care of quickly.

If you spend time with kids in the summer, you want to keep them safe while providing fun outdoor experiences. Did you know that over-exposure to the sun can pose serious health effects, especially in children? **You can take several simple actions to protect kids—and yourself.**

Do not Burn. Five or more sunburns can double your chance of getting skin cancer.

When the UV Index is “high,” “Very High,” or “Extreme”:



Limit outdoor activities between 10 am and 4 pm, when the sun is most intense.

Seek shade. When possible, conduct activities in a shaded area. Rotate players to allow breaks in the shade.



Generously apply sunscreen. Twenty minutes before going outside, liberally apply a broad-spectrum sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15. Reapply every two hours or after swimming or sweating.

Hats and sunglasses. Encourage kids to find a hat they like and wear it. Wide brim hats offer the most sun protection. Teach kids to wear sunglasses with 99 to 100 percent UV-A and UV-B protection.



Encourage t-shirts or full-length clothing instead of tank tops.
