Ironman Road Closures and Traffic Detours May 7th

Ivins City will again host a portion of the bicycle route for the Ford Ironman St. George Triathlon. The bicycle route that impacts Ivins will be from Pioneer Parkway north on 400 East to 400 South, where participants will turn west on 400 South and continue to Old Highway 91. The cyclists will complete the route two separate times throughout the day. Therefore, 400 South street will be closed to westbound traffic from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. the day of the race.

Traffic along the route and throughout the city will be heavily affected. If you live along the route, or your main access is on the route, Ivins City Public Safety Officers will be attempting to personally contact you in regard to specific instructions for race day. Some of the things you will need to know:

- Traffic on the north side of 400 South will be routed to Center Street (Snow Canyon Pkwy).
- Traffic south of 400 South will be directed to Old Highway 91 east of 400 South.
- Puerto Drive (600 East) is now open to through traffic into Santa Clara and is a great option for traffic traveling to St. George.

Last year, 200 East at 400 South was regulated to allow north and southbound traffic. This year it will also be regulated but please remember to expect up to a fifteen minute wait time at this intersection during high bicycle traffic. Please help us ensure the safety of these athletes by planning ahead for May 7th. The event traffic control will start at 8:00 a.m. and continue until approximately 4:00 p.m.

The second annual Ivins Fitness Festival will be held at UNITY Park the same day. Parking for the Fitness Festival is available at 100 West 520 South. Alternate parking is available in downtown St. George with shuttle busses running back and forth to this location in Ivins from 9:00 a.m. thru 2:00 p.m.

A Message from the National Crime Prevention Council

Helping older Americans from becoming victims of fraud and identity theft

Many legitimate companies and charities solicit consumers by phone and consider it an effective way to raise money or increase company business. Unfortunately, others are simply up to no good. The National Crime Prevention Council believes seniors can prevent telemarketing fraud by being educated consumers.



According to the FTC, nearly 25 million Americans are victims of consumer fraud each year. Senior citizens continue to be a rapidly increasing segment of the population, and that makes them a prime target for con artists and thieves. Americans who are 65 or older represent about 13 percent of our country's population, and their population will only continue to grow as the Baby Boomer generation begins to enter that age range.

Studies have shown that senior citizens are more at risk to be targeted by telemarketing scams than other age groups, and fraudulent telemarketers direct anywhere from 56 to 80 percent of their calls at older Americans. These con artists believe that



senior citizens are vulnerable and more susceptible to their tricks. However the National Crime Prevention Council is helping many seniors to be shrewd and savvy citizens by keeping these tips in mind:

- Offers too good to be true usually are. Ask to receive the “unbelievable deal” or the “amazing prize offer” in writing so you can read it carefully before making a commitment.
- Never give out your personal information over the phone or Internet unless you have initiated the contact. Legitimate business callers will never ask you for this information over the phone.
- If a caller asks you to pay for an offer in advance or asks for your credit card number or Social Security number, tell the person you don't give out personal information over the telephone.
- Remember that legitimate telemarketers won't be turned off if you use these techniques. They will appreciate dealing with an educated consumer. *It's not rude – it's shrewd!*

Historic Township Improvement Update

Improvements in the Historic Township continue to be installed from the west to the east. Many of you have probably noticed that several streets are now paved, and several residents living along these streets have installed improvements up to the sidewalk. What a difference this has made and it looks wonderful. Some of you are also probably wondering why it takes so long to pave the streets after work has begun. In brief, underground utilities, i.e. gas, phone, power, water, need to be lowered or relocated, the streets then need to be over excavated and re-compacted because of the soil types and conditions, base material is then placed and compacted, curb, gutter, and sidewalk is then installed and allowed to cure, followed by paving. All of these tasks take time to complete. Also, in an attempt to keep costs as low as possible, the contractor doing these improvements tries to have several streets ready for paving before having the paving company do the work. Doing this negates the paving company from having to mobilize frequently, keeping costs down.

The City cannot express enough gratitude and appreciation to everyone for their patience and understanding during this large construction project. Curbside recycling is now available on a voluntary basis in Ivins City. The program details are as follows:



- Every other week collection.
- Blue 95 gallon container is provided.
- Collection of:
 - Plastics (all kinds)
 - Cardboard
 - Paper
 - Metals
 - Aluminum
- \$6 per month billed quarterly.
- Fluctuating fuel fees of between \$.50 and \$1.50 per month.

Speeding, Speeding, Speeding

Speeding, Speeding, Speeding – got your attention yet? It seems with our new roads we are seeing an increase in the traveling speeds in those neighborhoods. I understand when one sees clear, clean asphalt with no traffic we may have a tendency to increase the weight on the gas pedal. We are moving the speed trailers in an attempt to get folks traveling down those roads to notice their speed and if appropriate to SLOW down.

As a reminder, if you are traveling on a neighborhood road at 25 mph, you are actually traveling approximately 40 feet per second. If a child runs in front of you it will take you approximately 80 feet to react and to slow to a stop. Now for all of you math experts, these are estimations. It could take longer or shorter to stop given weather, reaction times, type of car, etc. Generally, you will not be able to stop in time. Now add 10 or 15 mph and you can see how the danger increases.

Our new road improvements are wonderful both for travel and appeal. It is important for the quality of life that we travel at or below the limit in our neighborhoods. I have lived on streets where speeding was the norm and it was simply awful. I worried about my children and each time I pulled out of my driveway, it was unpleasant.



We worry at the Police Department about being too aggressive when it comes to enforcing our traffic laws. The last thing we want is a reputation that we "pick" on our citizens when it comes to speed. But, frankly enforcement is an important part of what we are paid to do. However, it is important for us to respond to the speeding complaints and we will do just that. So, please be mindful of your speed, if you choose not to it could be hazardous to your insurance rates!

WEEDS !!!

Well, once again this year we seem to have raised a banner crop of weeds. The City has sent out Courtesy Notices and a few Violation Notices. This means that some people may be fined up to twenty five dollars a day for the pleasure of growing weeds. To make sure you're not one of those people, remember that once the weeds get over six inches tall, you could get a Courtesy Notice followed by the Violation Notice.



Another problem within the city, and identified by the Ivins City Code, is storage of personal property. This can be anything from building materials and old appliances to project vehicles or trailers. Our City Code allows for one unlicensed vehicle to be in the front area of a property. Ivins does not allow trailers of any kind to be parked or stored on a city street, except when being used for commerce. To put it another way, you can't park your commercial trailer in front of your house for storage.

Remember that all automobiles and trailers must be parked with the left side of the vehicle parallel to the curb. If you live in a 'Circle' or 'Court' you still have to park this way. It is difficult to get emergency equipment such as Ambulances and Fire trucks in and around if you park the front or back of the vehicle toward the curb.

Blue Sky Solar Project Ribbon Cutting

On Monday April 18th we held a ribbon cutting ceremony for our Rocky Mountain Power "Blue Sky" funded solar project at City Hall. It was the culmination of an effort we began last year that resulted in two significant renewable energy grants providing needed energy efficiency upgrades and solar photovoltaic systems on four City structures. Mark Cox was in attendance representing Rocky Mountain Power. He explained the Blue Sky program and how Ivins City came to be the recipient of their generous grant. Mark Richards from Intermountain Wind and Solar, the contractor on the projects, described the systems including some of the new technologies that were incorporated and efforts that were made to minimize their visual impact.



As part of the ceremony we officially launched the Ivins Blue Sky Community Challenge urging residents to sign up to help us achieve our goal of "Half Again" going from our current 157 to 236 participants. Kai Reed who is spearheading this effort explained that the challenge continues until October 4th and that joining is simple and inexpensive. Each individual decides how many blocks of Blue Sky power they want to purchase at \$1.95

per block per month then adds that amount to their monthly power bill. Enrollment can be done online or with your Rocky Mountain Power monthly payment. Those with questions or needing assistance please contact Kai Reed at kaiallenreed@gmail.com or call her at 674-5376.



Kai also thanked the residents who have generously supported the City in achieving Blue Sky status by donating to cover its obligation under the program. We're asking all who join or who are current participants to donate \$10.00 or less per year paid directly to Ivins City for that specific purpose so we can perpetuate our Blue Sky Community status.



Chuck Gillette, our City Engineer, described some technical aspects of the projects and the remarkable monitoring program that allows us to observe and graph the productivity of each individual panel or system by the hour, day, month or year. A digital display panel will soon be installed in the City Hall lobby that will show our solar power production at any given moment or the various production histories. It's pretty cool and you're welcome to come by and check it out.

The City now stands to save over \$8,500.00 per year on its electric bills at current rates and these systems will continue to produce power for more than thirty years. In addition, as a Blue Sky Community we are one of only ten cities in Utah eligible to apply for additional Blue Sky grants under Rocky Mountain Power's new rules. We will most certainly do that as we identify additional projects worthy of their consideration. For now though I just want to say "thank you" Rocky Mountain Power for helping us to fulfill our vision for the future. The "Blue Sky" solar project ribbon cutting was an important event in our City. Let's do it again sometime.

The Pet Corner

Greeting from the Ivins Animal Shelter & Adoption Center
This is the time of the year when we are getting calls about babies. Baby birds of all kinds including Quail and baby rabbits. Here are a few suggestions to help us help you when finding a bird or rabbit in your yard or out in the community. Taking care of wild baby birds and other baby animals takes a tremendous amount of time and knowledge so before attempting to rescue them please be mindful of the following:

- Baby birds that can stand on their own are fledglings. They are learning to fly. Their parents are nearby and will continue to feed them even on the ground. If you find that a nest has been blown down you can put the baby birds in a basket and tie it to the branches of a bush or tree. It is a myth that the parents will not feed them if touched by humans.
- If cats are a problem, keep them indoors for a couple of days. If it is neighboring cats or predators, try to move the birds to dense shrubbery.
- Without knowing you could be adding to the stress of a wild bird by handling it. Without the proper training, your best bet is to leave wild baby birds alone. Nature as we all know is not always kind, but it is perfect.



Wild rabbits often make their nest in areas that boggle our minds. Rabbits hide their nest in plain view. If you find a nest that has been disturbed do all you can to restore and protect it rather than bring the babies indoors. If a dog has discovered

the nest put a wheel barrel over it so the mother will still be able to get to it. Mother rabbits nurse their babies for five minutes a day. They are with the babies early in the morning and then again at night. Most people think the nest has been abandoned, when in fact it is not. Baby rabbits with fur on them can survive on their own without their mother when they are no longer nursing. You can place them in an area that has lots of cover from predators and they will do fine on their own.

Finally animal control will be happy to help with any questions you might have and we suggest that you also keep Wildlife Rehabilitator Directory on hand. The closest facility is in Cedar City. The name is Southwest Wildlife Foundation and their email address is info@gowildlife.org. Their telephone number is 435-586-4693.

We want everyone to enjoy using the parks but, as we do every year at this time, we want remind everyone of a few rules that, if followed, will keep people safe and help keep the parks nice.

- Please remember to clean up after yourself and put trash in garbage cans.
- Please don't ride bikes, scooters, skateboards, roller blades, etc. near or under pavilions, on the tennis & basketball courts (at UNITY Park) on tables, bleachers or trash cans.
- Please do not play and run on the picnic tables, it is not sanitary and you could fall and hurt yourself.
- If you have your dogs or cats with you in the parks, they must **always** be on a leash under your control. You are responsible to pick up after them. Please keep in mind when you have your pets with you in the parks that dog urine is very harmful to the grass and will kill it.
- If you happen to live where your property is adjacent to a park or city right of way, please remember that it is not ok to dump your yard waste (grass clippings, weeds, etc.) on city property.
- All of our playgrounds and swings (as are most play structures & swings) are designed for children 5 to 12 years old. If you are older than this, it might be a good idea not to use the play structures and swings as they are not designed for your age group.

If you see vandalism or problems in the parks please let us know as soon as you discover them so we can get them taken care of quickly. If vandalism occurs during a time when the City offices are closed please call Dispatch at 435-634-5730 and report it to the police.

Vandalism and other areas of concern

April was the worst month for vandalism. The Ivins City Park restroom suffered a great deal of damage and had to be closed for over a week so replacement equipment could be purchased, shipped and installed. This level of vandalism affects many people; the parks staff who must clean up the mess and replace what had been perfectly good equipment, the police officers who must take the report and conduct the investigation, the citizens of Ivins who temporarily lose use of the facility and who's tax dollars are spent to repair and replace the damaged equipment. The cost for the replacement equipment is only about \$200. However, when you start adding up the time that it has taken Park staff and Public Safety staff to address this issue, and consider loss of the use of the facility, it will be measured in thousands of dollars. Money wasted for no good reason. Please, if you see vandalism in the parks, report it to the police immediately so we can get it taken care of. If the vandalism occurs during a time when the municipal offices are closed, please call Dispatch at 435-634-5730 and report it to the police.
