Halloween Safety Tips

In preparation for the upcoming Halloween season, the Ivins City Public Safety Department has some safety tips for your family.

- Plan your trick-or-treat route ahead of time. Pick streets you know and that are well lit
- Take a parent or an older sister or brother with you when you go trick-or-treating. If someone older cannot go, then go with a group.
- Trick-or-treat when it is still light outside.
- Wear a costume that makes it easy for you to walk and that can be seen after dark.
- Carry a flashlight and use reflective tape on your costumes so people driving cars can see you.
- If possible, wear make-up instead of a mask. If you wear a mask, take it off before crossing streets.
- Cross only at corners, never cross the street between parked cars or in the middle of a busy block.
- If there are no sidewalks, walk facing oncoming traffic to make sure you can see cars.
- Do not eat your candy until you get home and have an adult check it to make sure it's safe.

Pollution Prevention

Did you know that all water running in the streets will go into a storm drain that takes it straight to the local rivers? I would guess that most are not aware that the State has identified the Santa Clara River and the Virgin River as water quality impaired due to the high concentration of selenium and dissolved solids? We need to be certain that the activities we are involved with do not make this problem worse. Cleaner rivers is better for our parks, fish habitat, birds and us.

Here are some things that you can do to help:

- **Sweep up** your concrete surfaces, don't spray.
- **Wash your car at a carwash** or if you do wash at home try to do it in an area where the wash water will absorb into the ground rather than into the gutter.
- **Do not overwater** your landscaping. This water will deliver contaminants straight to the river especially if you are using too much fertilizers and pesticides.
- **Dispose of oils, chemicals and paints properly.** See our website: ivins.com for information on proper disposal. Most chemicals are best to be used up for its intended purpose, but if you must dispose of something a perfect opportunity is upcoming at the Washington County Landfill on October 29th, 2011 called the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day. The landfill will take your household waste for free. This is a common event held twice per year. For more details see the landfill website: wscw.org
- **Keep our community clean of litter and trash.** Don't be afraid to pick up trash even if it isn't yours. Pick up your pet waste and dispose. There are several community programs to help us keep the City clean:
 - ◇ As part of the **Community Cleanup Program**, the City provides dumpsters at the City Yard next to the Cemetery at least one Saturday per month and sometimes two Saturdays. Use these opportunities to keep the community clean. October 8th and November 19th are the next Community Cleanup Dumpster dates.
 - ◇ The **Adopt-a-Block Program** is a program where individuals, families, neighbors, or service groups may sign up to act as a steward over part of the streets.
 - ◇ The **Compost Program** is available to take organic waste to City of St. George or Washington County Landfill for recycling into compost.

Pollution Prevention Hotline

It is against the law to dump hazardous chemicals into the street, a stormdrain or a wash. If you see someone deliberately dumping or even an accidental spill please contact the emergency pollution prevention hotline so that the community can appropriately respond. A Historic Change

The road improvements in the Historic Township are now complete. Over the last nine months we've watched as the area from 200 West to 200 East and from 200 South to 400 North has been transformed section by section with new curb & gutter, sidewalks and paved streets. It is a remarkable change not only in the appearance of the City right-of-way but also in the safety afforded pedestrians and in our ability to manage storm water run-off.

We've only had a couple of moderate rainstorms since the project has neared completion but they've been enough to let us see the storm water flow along the east/west streets rather than through low-lying yards and down the north/south streets to the storm sewer inlets without carving up the shoulder, muddying up the streets and leaving a mess for City crews to clean up.

It was about a year and a half ago when McKenzie Hansen appeared before the City Council pleading with us to do something about the streets near her home and to put in sidewalks so that her children and the other neighborhood kids could safely walk to school. We explored the possibilities and came up with a plan and proposal that was presented to the township residents. For various reasons some were opposed but the majority approved the funding mechanism and the project was designed and put out to bid.



Desert Hills Construction was the successful bidder. A contract was signed with them in January of this year. Construction began in February and is wrapping up this week. What a great company they've

proven themselves to be. Their unflinching adherence to the design requirements and skillful execution has resulted in a very high quality product. Beyond that they've dealt with a myriad of problems in the form of old or unmapped utilities, maintaining access, managing dust and runoff, diverting traffic and maintaining the safety of our neighborhoods. They even put up with a nosy Mayor who drove through the middle of whatever they were doing twice a day.

Not only did they deal with all these things but they did so cheerfully and cooperatively. Michelle Frost, their Public Relations Officer knocked on virtually every door, passed out information and with a smile dealt with the needs and problems of our residents. Rhett Jeffrey, their Superintendent did an outstanding job not only scheduling his own crews and material deliveries but coordinating with Questar Gas, Rocky Mountain Power Qwest and Baja Cable to get utilities moved and services reconnected. In addition to the grading, concrete work and paving he was also responsible for several associated pipeline projects, some anticipated & some not, that involved moving, up-sizing or extending water, storm sewer and irrigation lines. I was particularly impressed by his response to my requests to finish 100 East from Center Street to 100 North as a part of our

24th of July Parade route and the last section south of Center Street in time for the opening day of school. Neither area was scheduled to be done in those time frames and appeared impossible to complete, but he somehow made it happen.



I want to compliment Rosenberg Engineering as well for providing an excellent design for a very complicated location. The previously existing roads and most of the homes in the township area were built on natural grade resulting in drainage problems and even flooding at times. To design new roads that reasonably matched existing yards and driveways while solving a multitude of drainage issues was no small task. Intersections had to be lowered by over two feet in some cases and a couple of road sections had to be raised by almost that amount to make it work but they did it. In addition their timely and accurate surveying work was essential for the project to move forward as planned.

Another key ingredient in the success of this project was our City Staff. From top to bottom they performed exceptionally well. Chuck Gillette our City Engineer and Dave Glenn our Public Works Director were tasked with overseeing it. They chose to manage it themselves and do the inspection work "in house" saving the City a significant amount of money. Cody Mitchell became the face of the City in the construction zone as he worked with the contractor and residents every day to solve their problems and get answers to their questions. He became the go-to-guy that everyone knew they could count on. Shiloh Pentz and his Public Works crew were constantly on call and performed numerous tasks that fell outside the scope of the contractor's responsibility.

Lastly I want to thank you who live in the township area. It was obvious your lives were disrupted for a time. Construction is a dirty, noisy and inconvenient process. For the most part you endured it patiently. Only a few of you called the City with questions or concerns. Some of you who originally opposed the project have made a point of letting us know that you like the way it's turned out. To your further credit very little vandalism occurred and none was directed at the contractor's equipment. But the frosting on the cake is that many of you have or are in the process of extending your driveways and finishing your landscaping to the back of your new sidewalk. It looks great and shows the pride you feel for your home and community.



The ribbon cutting will be held in conjunction with Heritage Days on Thursday October 6th at 6:00 pm at Ivins City Park. I invite you all to come. The ribbon will be cut by McKenzie Hansen assisted by Rhett Jeffrey representing the contractor and Cody Mitchell representing staff. The Cruizin' Knights Car Club will be joining us with their collection of vintage cars and will drive through the project area honking their horns for five minutes after the ribbon cutting in celebration. Everyone is welcome to join them. It's a day many thought would never come and it marks a historic change in our City.

The long-term goal of Safe Kids Walk This Way is to increase walking and make neighborhoods safer for walking to school. We encourage you to become involved in this program! In the meantime, here are some helpful tips for walking safely with your child:

- Recommend that children under age 10 not cross streets alone. Children need to be old enough to develop the skills to cross streets safely.
- Always model and teach proper pedestrian behavior.
- Instruct children to look left, right and left again when crossing streets and to continue looking as they cross.
- Make sure children don't run into streets or dart from between parked cars.
- Require children to wear retro reflective materials and carry a flashlight at dawn, at dusk and in bad weather.

Want to Reduce Your Utility Bill?

Interested in saving a little money on your monthly utility bill? One way to painlessly achieve this is by following a few water conservation tips. We thought we would give you a couple of simple ones to try.

- Check your toilet for leaks by putting a little food coloring in your toilet tank. If the coloring begins to appear in the bowl without flushing, you have a leak. A leaking toilet can waste more than 100 gallons of water a day.
- Install water saving shower heads or flow restrictors. Many shower heads put out 5 to 10 gallons of water a minute, where 3 gallons is actually enough.
- Don't let the water run while brushing your teeth or shaving. There is no need to keep pouring water down the drain.
- Use your automatic dishwasher only for full loads. Each load you run uses about 25 gallons of water. If you wash dishes by hand, don't leave the water running for rinsing.
- Only use your automatic washing machine for full loads. Each load uses 30 to 35 gallons of water.
- Don't let the hose run while washing your car. Soap down your car with a pail of soapy water, and then use a hose just to rinse it off.

Following these simple tips could make a difference on your utility bill. Many more tips and water saving ideas can be found on the internet.

The Pet Corner

Greeting from the Ivins Animal Shelter Aggie Smith, Ivins Animal Shelter

I would like to thank the community for their continued support of the shelter thru donations and volunteers. We could not do the work we do at the shelter without this.

I want to talk to pet owners about the occurrence of distemper in the Washington County area. Recently, several cases have come to light in the local shelters and rescue groups. Distemper is a disease caused by the Canine Distemper Virus (CDV) which is highly infectious and fatal half of the time. Many pet owners are surprised to learn it is closely related to the measles virus. Fortunately, you can prevent your dog or more susceptible puppy to this disease by vaccinating your pet. CDV is air-

borne and spreads through respiratory secretions, easily entering a dog's body through nose and mouth while simply breathing. After about 10 to 14 days after contacting the virus, it replicates itself rapidly, silently spreading through the body with no outward or noticeable symptoms. This disease comes in two parts: first, running nose and eyes, fever, diarrhea, vomiting; secondly, the dog may survive this part only to have the disease travel to the nervous system attacking the brain causing unsteady gait, falling over and eventually seizures. Once the infection moves to the brain there is little to be done for the dog. Those who survive are usually blinded, and have lifelong symptoms of palsy. There is no treatment for CDV once it is contacted, only supportive care with a 50/50 chance of survival.

Most places in the U.S.A. have not seen a case in 10 years. However, recent reports from Arizona show twenty thousand cases reported. They believe it may be being spread from Mexico where they do not vaccinate their dogs or leash them. The disease can be passed along to wild animals such as coyotes and raccoons, making it easier to cross state lines. Vaccinations for distemper are available at all vets and are a small price to pay for peace of mind. Puppies are the most at risk and need four shots from six weeks until four months of age. You can purchase the vaccine at local feed stores or online and give the shot yourself if you feel comfortable in doing so.

With the weather cooling off people are opening their windows again. We have had several complaints of barking dogs. Please be mindful of the amount of time your dog may be barking. Ivins City has an ordinance in place for animals disturbing the peace. Excessive barking of your pet will bring a warning first and could lead to a citation for disturbing the neighborhood.
