Township Update

The Township Improvement project is nearing completion and the improvements are looking very nice. The last area that will be completed is Center Street between 200 West and 300 West. The 200 West and Center Street intersection will require some storm drain pipe installation, in addition to the street improvements, and will require this intersection to be closed for two to three weeks beginning around the middle of September. Detours will be necessary.

Also, many residents are interested in installing improvements up to the back of sidewalk. If you are planning on doing this, please call the public works department at 634-0689 so we can determine if your water meter or any fire hydrants need to be moved closer to the sidewalk. If so, we will relocate them so they aren't left in the middle of your finished yard. All meters and hydrants, if possible, will eventually be relocated closer to the sidewalk, but for those who wish to install improvements before this is accomplished, we will try to expedite those requests.

Utility E-Bill Available

Recently new utility billing software was purchased to allow utility bills to be sent via email. You may sign up for this option on our website, www.ivins.com. From the homepage, select "Utilities" in the main toolbar. Scroll down until you see "Sign Up for e-bill." You will receive a confirmation acknowledging you have signed up for the program. Also noted on this page is the option to set up electronic debit which allows the City to electronically debit your checking account each month. Maintenance of Right-of-Way

The City Council recently amended the requirements for the maintenance of street right-of-way and sidewalks. The requirements for property owners are:

- **Sidewalks**
Snow, hail, sleet, or ice should be removed from a paved sidewalk that is immediately adjacent to a property owner's front and side yard as soon as possible and no more than 24 hours after the storm.
Dirt, leaves, weeds or other debris should be removed from the sidewalk.
- **Street Right-of-Way**
The immediately adjacent property owner shall maintain the unused public right of way in a neat and orderly manner – kept free of weeds and debris. EXCEPTION: PROPERTY EITHER ZONED AGRICULTURAL OR PROPERTY THAT IS BEING ACTIVELY USED FOR AGRICULTURAL PURPOSES AS LONG AS NO IRRIGATION WATER IS ALLOWED ONTO THE UNUSED PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY.

 - Never fly another flag above our flag
 - When raising our flag do so quickly
 - When lowering our flag do so slowly
- *Give unusable flag to a Boy Scout who will see that it is disposed of properly on Flag Day, June 6, in full ceremony.




**Dumpsters are located next to the Public Works Yard behind the City Cemetery. They are available on a first come first serve basis beginning at 8:00am and close that same day once full.

Street Maintenance Costs

If properly constructed, a new asphalt street can be expected to last approximately twenty years if no maintenance is ever performed during that time. However, the service life of the same street can be extended by many more years, possibly even doubling the life span, when a properly timed surface treatment is applied.



The two charts shown here indicate when certain maintenance should occur and the cost savings of applying surface treatments vs rehabilitation. As you can see, preventive maintenance costs are substantially less during the same time period, in this case, thirty years.

The worst way of analyzing street maintenance is the policy of "worst-first". Streets that have reached worst-first status require more than simple surface treatments, rather rehabilitation and replacement are likely necessary and costs increase exponentially. Pavements that are in good shape are much cheaper to maintain than those in bad shape. The timely application of pavement maintenance techniques serves to help prevent or slow down the aging of a street. The top priority in any maintenance budget should be to first extend the life-span of good pavements for as long as possible before expending all available resources on only one project.

Child Passenger Safety

Have you ever walked into a department store looking for the perfect car seat for your newborn or toddler and been overwhelmed with the number of choices available? Not only choices involving safety, but is it a decent color, is it going to be the right size, will they out grow it soon, how much is it going to cost, etc. Overwhelming as it may be, having a child in an appropriate seat (height, weight, age) is essential to your child's safety.

More children ages 6 to 14 die from traffic crashes than from anything else. But even more startling is the fact that over half of the 4 to 7-year-olds who die in crashes are buckled in seat belts. The truth is that these younger children are not safe and adequately protected by seat belts alone.

Know the Law

In Utah, children up to age 8 (through age 7) must be in an appropriate child safety or booster seat when traveling in a passenger vehicle.

There is an exception to the law that states that children younger than 8 are not required to be in a booster seat if they are at least 57 inches tall (4' 9"). At that point, they should use the vehicle's lap and shoulder belt without a booster.



Child Passenger Safety Classes

Southwest Utah Public Health Department offers FREE regular child passenger safety classes. These safety classes are focused on the proper use of child restraints; car seats, booster seats, and safety belts. Parents and caregivers are taught how to ensure correct installation and use of child passenger safety equipment. Five county residents attending the course are eligible for a low cost car seat. This training will help answer the following questions.

- What child restraint system is right for my child?
- How do I adjust a child restraint system to properly fit my child?
- How do I properly install a car seat in my vehicle?
- What is the safest system to secure my child's car seat, the anchor or the seat belt?
- How long should my child be in a booster seat?

Ivins Public Safety Warns Residents of Scam: Grandchild Needing Money

Ivins Police Department is warning residents of another scam which has been brought to our attention.



According to reports, police have been made aware of a scam involving phone calls made to elderly residents. The scenario over the phone is usually similar to this: the caller poses as a grandchild and when the phone is answered they say, "Hi, is this Grandma?" The victim, who is momentarily confused, assumes they are talking to their grandchild. The grandparent will say, "Is that you Joey?" When the caller responds, "yes" the bait is taken and the hook is in place. Next, the caller will say they are in some type of trouble (in jail) and they need money, usually cash

via money transfer. The caller says where money can be wired to. There have been times a caller has posed as a close friend of the grandchild and asks if it's ok to pick the money up. The unsuspecting grandparent has now become a victim of this scam. Police said "We are concerned our residents could fall prey to this type of scam; we're trying to let them know these types of scams are taking place and be aware of them."

Police are asking residents to be on guard for these types of phone calls. Again, if you don't recognize the person on the phone as your grandchild, ask pertinent family questions only a grandchild would be able to answer. Do not withdraw money out of your bank account or make any arrangements to send money without first speaking with your grandchild or other family members. We recommend telling the person on the phone you need to check into this situation further and hang up. If you would like, call your grandchild and make sure they are ok.

4. You will feel better. Pets have a way of putting a smile on your face and a spring in your step. Not only do animals give you unconditional love, but they have been shown to be psychologically, emotionally and physically beneficial. Caring for a companion animal can provide a sense of purpose and fulfillment and lessen feelings of loneliness and isolation in all age groups.

5. You won't be supporting puppy mills and pet stores. Puppy mills are factory style dog breeding facilities that put profit ahead of animal welfare. By adopting instead of buying a pet you can be certain you are not supporting cruel puppy mills. Visit your shelter and see all the wonderful dogs, puppies, cats, and kittens that will make your home and family complete.



Kitties & Litter

First to the "Kitties." A year ago the City Council passed an ordinance establishing the Ivins Animal Shelter and Adoption Center as a "no kill" facility making it unique among municipal shelters. The result is that shelter animals are kept until they are adopted virtually without exception. The policy has brought considerable notoriety to the City and has broadened the base of support for the shelter far beyond our boundaries. Animals have been adopted from as far away as New Jersey.

For the system to function without being a financial burden to our residents, kindhearted volunteers work at the shelter every day helping to care for the animals and clean the facility. Support groups provide additional help and raise money for food and veterinary care. "FIAS" or Friends of Ivins Animal Shelter was established six years ago and has worked tirelessly on behalf of the shelter since its inception. Recently the City signed a second "memorandum of understanding" with "INKAS" or Ivins No Kill Animal Supporters whose mission is similar and whose efforts expand the outreach and financial support for the shelter.

These two non-profit corporations provide an invaluable service to the City by hosting regular fund raising and adoption events. Their focused efforts to promote the adoption of disfigured or abused animals have lead to several unlikely happy endings. I'm aware of other situations where unadoptable animals were rehabilitated from inappropriate behaviors or taken into foster care to be socialized so that they could eventually be placed in loving homes.

Aggie Smith, the Shelter manager and her assistant Todd O'Bray do an outstanding job of running the facility and dealing with animal control issues within the City. You don't need to be around them long to recognize that this is a labor of love for them. Their commitment to the well being of the animals and patience in the face of difficult circumstances is admirable. Sadly most of those difficult circumstances are caused by people, not animals.

Recently eight unwanted kittens were left on the shelter doorstep and it's not the first time. Often malnourished or mistreated animals end up there as well. Pet ownership is a responsibility that includes the obligation to not only provide them with food and shelter but to spay and neuter them as well. It's the only way to reduce the unwanted pet population in our community. A recent USA Today article noted that a female cat can have kittens as early as age six months and can have as many as four litters per year with as many as six to eight kittens per litter. That leads to aggravated neighbors and eventually to an added burden on the shelter or contributes to the growth of feral (wild) cat communities like the ones we're dealing with now through a catch, neuter and release (CNR) program.

I urge every Ivins pet owner to see to it that your pets are spayed or neutered. Spay & Neuter Clinics are held regularly providing the opportunity for this quick, simple and safe procedure to be performed on your pets at a reduced cost to you. FIAS is sponsoring the next such event on Wednesday September 7th at the Washington Family Veterinary Clinic. For more details call 435-673-6718. In addition to helping control overpopulation it should be noted that spayed and neutered animals are better behaved and healthier.

And now to the "Litter." Ivins City participates in a County wide recycling program. We have a number of recycling "binnies" located in the parking lot behind City Hall labeled to receive either paper, glass, metal or plastic.

The City is paid based on the volume of recyclables collected each year. Last year we received a \$6,000.00 check from the solid waste district for approximately eighteen months of collections. The City Council decided to use those revenues to support the animal shelter.

Thanks to many of you who recycle we're on track to increase that amount this year. I would urge all of you who don't do it already to set aside those four recyclable materials and make a periodic trek to City Hall to discard them. There are inexpensive colored recycling baskets available at area businesses to



help you with the sorting and transport of the materials. You will be helping the environment and our shelter animals all at once.

I take great pride as do many of you in our "no kill" Ivins Animal Shelter and Adoption Center. Two and a half years ago I helped expand and remodel the building with several of you and it remains a "pet" project of mine (pun absolutely intended). The facility, the staff, the volunteers, FIAS and now INKAS are all outstanding examples of how animal control can be humanely handled. It does and will continue to serve as a model for other like-minded cities to follow. It reflects well on the City and its residents that we would pioneer a "no kill philosophy," affirm it in an ordinance and develop a system of support to make it work. Thanks to all who have helped make it possible and to all who are willing to join in by volunteering at the shelter, becoming members of FIAS or INKAS or by simply recycling those items you'd commonly find on the roadside giving new meaning to the words "kitty litter".
