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## Pipe Dream Chris Hart, Mayor



For the last year I have served as a member of the Community Integrated Resource Planning Advisory Committee (CIRPAC). It was organized by the Washington County Water Conservancy District (WCWCD) in an attempt to improve our understanding of water related issues and to discuss possible solutions for the inevitable problems that lie ahead. The nearly thirty member committee consisted of civic leaders and representatives of various water interests county wide. Each monthly meeting featured one or two presenters discussing a wide range of water related topics including the water cycle, sources of supply, storage, distribution, consumption, conservation programs, water law and the economic impact of inadequate water resources.

Area residents were invited to attend and provide written questions. We always had some from Ivins present. As you can imagine the group was very diverse with opinions ranging from one end of the spectrum to the other. My hope going into it was that facts could be separated from fiction and that based on them we would have a clear understanding of what needed to be done going forward. I'm not sure we made it quite that far. Letters to the editor and newspaper articles on the proposed Lake Powell Pipeline presented multiple viewpoints as to its cost, practicality, and possible alternatives but left many confused. The CIRPAC meetings were helpful in their attempt to provide clarity but likely didn't change many opinions.

The indisputable facts as I see them are these. We have an average annual rainfall nearly half that of Phoenix and are one of the driest places in the country. We are currently wholly reliant on the Virgin River watershed and a single aquifer to supply our needs. As they go we go. With no redundancy in the system we will continue to experience regional droughts like the one we're in. Despite the efforts of the WCWCD to develop sources and improve storage & distribution our continuing patterns of growth and average per-capita use will leave us short of water within the next fifteen years.



So what's the solution? Well, pick your poison. To some it is to fully develop all the nearby sources of supply and implement conservation standards that will drive down consumption to the point of allowing growth without investing in a pipeline. Amelia Nuding of the Western Resource Advocates group wrote a fascinating study on this alternative and presented it at one of the CIRPAC meetings. She contends that through conservation regulation and water pricing structures that penalize overuse we could defer the need for a pipeline-like solution for up to sixty years.

The objection to this point of view is that not everyone wishes to live in a Kayenta-like environment or to completely xeriscape their yards. And should we expect residents who were here long before most of us came to bear the expense of tearing out their mature trees & grass and replacing them with drought tolerant plants and hard scape? One unintended consequence of this approach is a hotter environment due to gravel ground cover and lack of shade resulting in an increase in air conditioning demand.

The Irvine Ranch California water model offers perhaps a more reasonable approach involving property by property assessments of irrigation need leading to an individual use standard with accelerated penalties for consumption beyond it. For sure wasting water is foolish in a desert and there are many more things that can be done to conserve. The Conservancy District currently offers incentives to replace high volume toilets or to install sophisticated irrigation timers that

sense conditions and water accordingly along with others. They can be seen on their website at [www.wcwcd.org](http://www.wcwcd.org). They also have under construction a demonstration garden that will display a wide variety of drought tolerant plants for us to consider.

Another option is to simply close the doors when we reach a population that exhausts our current water resources. Jeremy Agüero who conducted an independent regional water study and created economic models based on its availability presented some compelling data during one of the sessions illustrating that when water resources become uncertain or unreliable business investment dries up as well leading to zero or negative economic growth. His conclusion was that what may appear to be the least expensive solution to the problem may in fact be the most costly long term and vice versa. Again the question must be asked, should the next generation of families wishing to remain here or others like many of us who came here from other locations by choice be excluded? The answer to that question is not a simple one.

WCWCD has settled on the Lake Powel Pipeline as its long term solution. A great deal of study has already been done and it is currently in the environmental assessment stage of development with construction anticipated to begin within the next ten years. Proponents point out that beyond providing water for future growth the redundancy of resource would provide welcome insurance against future droughts and economic instability. Opponents counter that the cost is too high, the security of the source is questionable and that the environmental consequences of such a project are unacceptable.

Whichever camp you're in the reality is that we continue to grow. Additional sources of water are limited. The process of regulating increased conservation standards and/or implementing a pipeline project requires time, nothing is getting any cheaper and we are headed for a crisis if we fail to act. I hope that you will join me in a serious study of this issue ignoring unsubstantiated claims and reaching thoughtful conclusions based on facts so we can determine together the course of action we ought to take.

## The Pet Corner

### Greetings from the Ivins Animal Shelter Aggie Smith, Ivins Animal Shelter

Ivins Animal Control has seen an increase in calls about dogs at large in our city. We want all our citizens to be informed as to the laws regarding this issue. Below are the city codes for animals at large. I also listed the city code for animals disturbing the neighborhood.



The city code 6.05.102 states "It shall be unlawful for the owner or custodian of any animal to allow such animals to run at large. The owner or person charged with responsibility for an animal found running at large shall be strictly liable for a violation of this section regardless of the precautions taken to prevent the escape of the animal and regardless of whether or not he knows that the animal is running at large." To make this clear this includes cats, as they are considered animals.

The city code 6.05.111 states "Dogs and cats disturbing neighborhood: It shall be unlawful for any person to harbor any dog or cat which by loud, continued or frequent barking, howling, yelping meowing, screeching or noxious or offensive odors shall annoy, disturb or endanger the health and welfare of any person or neighborhood." This section shall not apply to city animal shelter or veterinary hospital.

Dogs running at large cause so many problems for neighborhoods, dangers to cars and children, plus defecating on others property. This is not acceptable for the health and well-being of the neighborhood or of the dogs and cats.

The first thing Animal Control would like to see in any of these cases is civil communication between neighbors. So many times owners are just not aware of their dogs' barking. However if this does not resolve the issue, please call Animal Control. The first report to us we will issue a warning, the second report however does carry a penalty of a citation for violation of city ordinance.



Animal Control would be happy to answer any other questions you might have regarding these issues. We all want to keep Ivins a safe and enjoyable community for animals and people alike. Please contact us at 435-628-1049
