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Recreating our Recreation Plan

Recreation is a key ingredient in our appealing lifestyle. Many come here specifically for it. When I arrived here seventeen years ago Ivins had one park, the beginnings of a trail system and little in the way of recreational programs. Through wise planning we now have a major park facility with other smaller pocket parks dotting the landscape, miles of additional trails and numerous programs for both children and adults thanks to Benny Sorensen our Parks & Recreation Director and his staff. Running and cycling events are routine within our city limits and tournaments frequently fill our baseball and soccer fields.

Additional recreational facilities rank high on the list of priorities for many of our residents and represent an important investment in our developing image as a recreational destination. Unfortunately such facilities are expensive and can only be realized in bite size pieces. It is therefore important to have a long range plan that represents the interests of our residents so those facilities most in demand can find their way into our budgets.

 At our neighborhood meetings in January we devoted most of the time to recreational issues. The city is in the midst of revising its Parks & Recreation master plan and a number of ideas are being discussed. We asked those in attendance to fill out survey forms identifying their priorities and preferences. We intend to broaden the survey electronically to the entire community in the near future so that the revisions to this important plan reflect your input.

Some obvious deficiencies exist. Pickleball for example continues to increase in popularity and we have only modest temporary facilities in place at UNITY Park at the moment. There are courts planned in the next park to be built just off 200 East and 10th south but even they won't satisfy the demand that exists for them. Additional soccer and baseball fields would be utilized immediately if put in place but they require a lot of land in addition to the infrastructure and landscaping costs.

We are asked regularly about a recreation center. That too is included in our plan for the future but it requires a population base considerably larger than ours to support such a facility. We are exploring different options for locating that building at this time however. The city owns a sixteen acre parcel on Center Street at about 700 East that would accommodate a structure of that size but the preferred site based on current survey information is the corner of Main and Center Streets where an LDS meeting house is currently located. The concept of developing that entire city block into a civic center is appealing since it already contains our City Hall, fire station and Ivins City Park with room for an expanded City Hall and a library in the future. A recreation center in that location would utilize the existing parking lot and dramatically enhance the civic campus.

We also receive inquiries about swimming facilities. At present Ivins participates with St. George and Santa Clara cities in the nearby Sand Hollow Aquatic Center. Swimming facilities are expensive to construct and maintain so it's likely we will remain in that partnership for some time to come. If demand grows however that could be reconsidered in the future. Interest has been expressed by residents of our community in other specialized facilities like a dog park, a frisbee golf course and a BMX bike track. Each of those takes a lot of space so the city is looking at a possible exchange of the Center Street property for a much larger School and Institutional Trust Lands Administration (SITLA) parcel at the east end of 400 South that is less than ideal development property but would function splendidly as a major multi function city park.

On the nearer horizon is the improvement of the Ivins Reservoir as a swimming and recreation

area. Agreement in principle has been reached among the irrigation companies that use the reservoir for storage, the Shivwitz Band whose reservation property contains part of the reservoir, the Water Conservancy District who currently owns the balance of the property and manages the use of the reservoir and Ivins City who would manage and provide security for the recreation area. The plan is to isolate a three acre cove located at the southwest corner of the reservoir by building a causeway connecting the two existing sandbars and developing a sandy beach area around the bay with picnic pavilions, restrooms, lawn areas and a paved parking lot & access road. Fresh water will be circulated through the contained swimming area maintaining a high water level except in extremely dry conditions thus providing recreational opportunities for swimmers and non-motorized watercraft enthusiasts through the spring, summer and fall.

Cycling continues to gain popularity among our residents and visitors so the city has embarked on a program to obtain UDOT's "Road Respect Community" designation. With the effort lead by John & Kai Reed that which needed to be accomplished has been and we are scheduled to receive the official designation on the 29th of this month. A two day event has been planned around this important designation that will begin with a community forum being conducted in the new Veterans Home assembly hall on Wednesday evening the 28th of May at 6:00 p.m. facilitated by Kim Clark & Keri Gibson from Road Respect. They will be joined by Superintendent Col. Daniel Fuhr from the Utah Highway Patrol, Jordan Mathis Director of Promotion for the S.W. Health Dept., Heather Hallman Washington County Coordinator for Safe Kids Utah and local officials. We hope you will all mark your calendars and plan to attend to discuss ways to improve the interaction of cyclists and motorists on our roadways and enjoy a piece of pie & ice cream.

The following morning on May 29th two community rides will take place both departing from Ivins City Park. The first will begin at 8:30 a.m. for those interested in joining the Road Respect cyclists on a thirty eight mile "Veyo Loop" ride with a rest stop at Veyo Pies. From 10:30 to 11:30 a Bike Safety Rodeo will be held at the park conducted by SCI law enforcement officers and Safe Kids representatives. Fifty free helmets will be given away to kids accompanied by their parents and games & activities will be provided. At 11:30 a.m. I will join the Road Respect Cyclists leading a three mile Community Fun Ride through our city streets escorted by our SCI law enforcement officers. Returning back to the park at noon the formal presentation of the Road Respect designation will take place and two kid's bikes generously donated by our new cycling store IBB Cyclery will be given away to the winners accompanied by their parents. I hope you'll join us.

What is Reverse 9-1-1 & How Do I Sign Up?

The Reverse 911 notification system provides you with critical information quickly in case of an emergency or other situations such as unexpected road closures, missing persons, and evacuation of buildings or neighborhoods. You will receive time-sensitive messages using whichever method you specify, such as your home, cell, or business phone, email, text message, hearing impaired receiving devices, and more.

Upcoming Road Maintenance Projects

There are various treatments available for preserving asphalt streets. One such method is called a slurry seal. A slurry seal consists of emulsified asphalt, fine aggregate, mineral filler, and water, and are applied in a uniform thickness to the existing pavement. A slurry seal treatment is economical and will add several years of service life to the street. The following streets and areas, weather permitting, are scheduled for a slurry seal during the month of May/June:

- Historic Township from 450 North to 200 South between 200 East and 200 West
- Shadow Canyon subdivision
- Red Rock subdivision
- Green Acres subdivision
- 400 South between 400 West and 700 East
- 400 East between 580 South and Pioneer Parkway
- 150 East and 175 East between 400 South and 600 South
- 600 South between Main Street and 200 East
- 200 North between 200 West and 400 West
- 400 West between 200 North and 450 North
- 100 West and 200 West between 200 South and 400 South

The contractor will notify affected residents with special instructions regarding travel, parking, and contact information. The City asks that all residents please be patient during this treatment process.

The Pet Corner

Greetings from the Ivins Animal Shelter Aggie Smith, Ivins Animal Shelter

I would like to revisit this once again. We should always be prepared with an Evacuation plan for all our four legged friends during a natural disaster in Ivins and in Washington County.

It is the owner's responsibility to have emergency supplies and an in-home shelter for your pets. Here are some suggestions to have your home prepared for an emergency to keep your pet safe.

- Stay in your home and keep your pets indoors with you, unless evacuation becomes necessary
- Have crates and carriers on hand to keep your pets in
- Have leashes and crates marked with yours and your pets names
- Have ample water and food on hand to last at least three to seven days. Keep in airtight container
- Keep a seven day supply of drinking water for each pet and person. Keep in cool dark place and replace every two months
- Keep a supply of medicines and a first aid kit close at hand for both animals and humans
- Have stickers placed in your front windows informing responders of animals in your home
- Talk to your neighbors, friends, and relatives about creating a buddy system. Disasters don't wait to occur when you are at home; it's important that someone else is available to evacuate your children and pets to safety. Show them where your Evac-Pac is located
- Have an Evac-Pac which will contain these items:
 - Paper towels
 - Liquid soap, small bottle of bleach, garbage cleanup bags
 - Pet meds
 - Long leash, yard stake, blanket, toys, treats, seven days' worth of cage liner, i.e. newspaper
 - Cats: pillowcase or evac-sack, harness, leash, blanket, toys, small litter pan, scoopable litter
 - Birds: catch net, heavy towel, cuttlebone, blanket or sheet to cover the cage liner
 - Small animal: salt lick, extra water bottle, small hide tube, seven days' worth of bedding
 - Reptiles: pillowcase or evac-sack, warming device, i.e. hot water bottle soaking dish
 - Your family emergency kit to include: batteries, flashlights, radio, human first aid kit, duct tape, multi-tools, tarp, rope, permanent marker, fluorescent spray paint, baby wipes, toilet paper, protective clothing and footwear, extra cash, rescue whistle, blanket, important phone numbers, extra meds, and copies of medical, mortgage, and insurance info
 - Make sure everything has identification on it and keep your contact information up to date



Animal Control reminder - in order for strays to come to the Ivins Shelter from Ivins and Santa Clara, you must call dispatch to have an officer come to the location to pick up the stray. Strays cannot be brought to our shelter by the people who find them. Thank you for your understanding with this issue.

The weather is warm and everyone is looking for a place to cool off, but the Ivins Splash Pad has not yet been turned on! What is going on? We have decided that because we are in a serious drought that we will delay the opening of the Splash Pad until school lets out for the summer to help save water. This time of year has traditionally been a time where people use the splash pad because it is warm outside; however many people find that the water coming from the splash pad is way too cold to spend much time in it so they turn the water on a then go sit in the sun to warm up.

For those of you not familiar with the splash pad, it is located in UNITY Park at the corner of 400 South and 400 West. There are a number of water features that spray water on you and help keep you cool on hot days. The water source for the splash pad is fresh culinary water. After the water keeps you cool, it goes down the drain and into a storage tank where we keep it until late at night when we pump the water out of the tank through the irrigation system and onto the grass and landscape around the splash pad, thus we get to use the water twice! We will keep you updated if there are any changes.

There is a whole lot of concrete to ride on and draw on with chalk in UNITY Park, the only places we do not allow these activities are on the basketball and tennis courts, the pavilion and the Splash Pad. Please help take care of our facilities by using them as intended.



We are still finding lots of presents left by dogs in the parks and I do not have to tell you about the feeling you get when you suddenly step in one or when one of your children falls in one. Please, if you bring your dog to the park, please clean up after them! We provide bags in the parks for dog waste disposal, but sometimes they have all been used, so please bring a bag with you to the park just in case.

Also, please remember that dogs must be on a leash and under the control of a person at all times, which means that one end of the leash is attached to the dog and the other end is in the hand of a person.

We have recently had several chickens taken out of their coops by some animal during the night and then the animal has taken them to the Ivins City Park to eat them. We have not yet determined what we are dealing with, so for your pet's safety, please keep them secured when at home and on the leash when away from home.
