Recently the Federal Bureau of Land Management (BLM) released its Draft Resource Management Plan (RMP) for the Beaver Dam Wash and Red Cliffs National Conservation Areas. The document is nearly eleven hundred pages long complete with maps and photographs and covers a variety of topics relating to future uses of BLM managed land. It outlines four alternatives (A, B C & D) to be considered and commented upon with the idea that one of them will ultimately be adopted as formal regulation. It has taken over five years to complete and is now in its ninety day public comment period during which area residents have the opportunity to submit written statements concerning it.

Washington County and impacted Cities including ours are formally appealing for more time to digest the document and make our comments. That extension has not yet been granted. The County Attorney's Office and Washington County Water Conservancy District Staff among others are feverishly reviewing every line in an effort to fully understand the implications and impacts of proposed policy and land use changes contained within its pages. I am one of many who are concerned about the process that brought us this document and some of its provisions.

Federal law required the BLM to consult with the County and Cities in the development of this plan. Over the last five years BLM Staff communicated with County Officials on only a few occasions providing little opportunity for them to contribute to its content. St. George City was specifically named a "cooperating agency" but was overlooked completely and no other city was given the opportunity to be involved.

The Omnibus Public Lands Management Act of 2009 sometimes referred to as the "Washington County Lands Bill" was passed by Congress and signed into law by President Obama. The Bill sets limits on the areas in Washington County that can be regulated as wilderness area. It defines allowable uses such as cattle grazing, recreation and the development of essential infrastructure such as the Northern Transportation Route (NTR) or Northern Corridor. It called upon the Secretary of the Interior through the BLM to develop this Resource Management Plan for the purpose of managing our public lands as a public resource by providing opportunity for all of those activities to occur.

In my opinion the Draft RMP does not in all cases follow at least the spirit of that law. It declares that some areas not designated as wilderness will be managed in the same way and with the same restrictions. It designates one such area as "multi-species habitat" with no definition as to what that means or what and how those species would be "protected". It further introduces a program to import California condors into the region and give them full protection under the Endangered Species Act. I love condors and approve of their presence here. Some of them have been brought into the area experimentally and are flourishing. More are welcome but the "full protection" clause is of real concern. Condors have been known to range over a hundred miles so what might ultimately emerge as protected habitat could dwarf the Red Cliffs Desert Reserve set aside for the Desert Tortoise.

Water is another major concern. For the first time this Draft RMP declares that the BLM will seek to acquire all surface and subsurface water rights on and under BLM controlled lands. Over ten percent of our water currently comes from those sources through wells in Snow Canyon and elsewhere. Maps illustrate that the location of the Navajo Aquifer virtually mirrors the Red Cliffs National Conservation Area. Loss of access to the largest subsurface water resource in the County would be crippling. The Water Conservancy District also has extensive water rights in the Beaver Dam Wash Conservation Area that are intended to be developed in the future. For the BLM to secure all rights to these two important water sources appears to me to be nothing more than a policy to control regional growth.

Under the Draft RMP cattle grazing on public lands could be cut in half and become procedurally more complicated. Hunting, ATV and other recreational uses on those same lands could become further restricted. The Northern Transportation Route guaranteed in the Lands Bill has been essentially written out of the RMP. It misleadingly describes an impact zone of 6,345 that represents all the land included in and between four potential routes any one of which would consume only one hundred acres.



I currently serve as Chair of the Dixie Transportation Executive Committee. In that capacity I have been involved in numerous discussions concerning the Northern Transportation Route the need for which was identified in the early 1990s. It's been part of our regional transportation planning ever since. I have seen the projections created by sophisticated traffic modeling software based on potential growth areas and patterns that clearly illustrate the future need for the NTR. Without it the St. George transportation system will eventually become overwhelmed resulting in peak hour gridlock. The NTR is one segment of a future belt route around the greater St. George Metropolitan area that in my opinion will be an essential link in our regional transportation network. Concerns over its impact to critical habitat are justified and the eventual route must be carefully planned, but I believe it must be planned.

I have referred to the BLM Draft Resource Management Plan as a minefield. Much of it looks fine but there are elements within its pages that could blow up in our faces costing us more accessible land, more resources, more uses and ultimately more money. If you share my concerns I urge you to make contact with the Washington County Attorney's Office for more information. It will help if you mention your specific area of interest to obtain pertinent information concerning it. Statements merely in support of or in opposition to the document count for very little, but substantive statements about specific policies or provisions must by law be responded to. Greetings from the Ivins Animal Shelter

We soon will be enjoying Halloween but there are some precautions we should take such as keeping dogs from eating chocolate! This is a scary thing since chocolate can be fatal to dogs. So many factors are involved and the information is crucial,



yet there are only minutes to figure it out.

There are a few steps one can follow to help a dog that has eaten chocolate. First, call your vet and have them recommend a way to have your dog vomit. The steps may differ from breed to breed. Chocolate will make the dog thirsty so offer water, or even milk which should induce vomiting. It is key that your dog get the chocolate out of their system so it does not cause internal damage. Another option is to feed them their favorite food. This only works on little dogs, but it helps dilute the chocolate. In the case of a big dog, depending on how much chocolate it has eaten, it may just make them super hyper and then crash out. Regardless, chocolate is very deadly to dogs and you should always contact a vet.

There are any numbers of things that are poisonous to dogs and cats; here are a few you might not know about.

1. Grapes and raisins are toxic to dogs
2. Snail, slug and ant baits are toxic to both dogs and cats
3. Medications, unless directed by a vet. Acetaminophen is fatal to cats, as are common vitamins
4. Coffee grounds, cigarettes, alcoholic drinks and potpourri oils
5. Plants: Oleander, Sago palm, Easter lily, Yews

Finally, The ASAP has a National Animal Poison Control Center. Their hotline phone is # 888 4-ANI-HELP. The center is staffed 24 hours a day by licensed veterinarians trained in toxicology.
