



IN THE ZONE

I have received a number of emails from residents expressing concerns over or opposition to certain proposed developments within the City. Perhaps a brief review of the ordinances governing development and the approval process associated with it will be helpful.

When a municipality decides to create Zoning Districts (and most do) it must adhere to a number of requirements that are imposed by State Statute. First of all a Land Use Plan must be created as part of its General Plan that illustrates in a general way how various types of development are to be distributed throughout the city. Land-use "bubbles" are placed on a map of the City that without specifying particular parcels of land indicate where various types of residential densities and commercial development are anticipated to occur. The Land Use Plan begins with the Planning Commission and is eventually adopted by the City Council after



receiving public comment by both bodies and is reviewed and amended every few years.

Using the Land Use Plan as a guide, specific zones are created within the "bubbles" that more clearly identify the development types that will be permitted throughout the city. Each zone that appears in the Zoning Ordinance and on the Zoning Map is defined in detail and carries an accompanying Table of Uses that defines precisely what will and will not be allowed within each zone. Both the Land Use Map and the Zoning Map hang on the Council Chambers wall for you to check out, are accessible on the City

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website at www.lvins.com or can be obtained at City Hall.

Once the Land Use Plan, Land Use Map, Zoning Ordinance and Zoning Map are in place developers are obligated to design their projects accordingly or apply for a zone change if they have other intent. A zone change application triggers another public process beginning with the Planning Commission once again and concluding with the City Council. The application can be either approved or denied based on the merit of the project. However, if a proposed project application is consistent with the Zone and the accompanying Table of Uses by law the City generally cannot reject it.

This is where our Development Ordinances and Design Guidelines kick in. Ivins City has gone to great lengths to establish standards for building height, roof and wall articulation, coloration, lighting, signage, project walls, street landscaping and other features in addition to the technical requirements governing road cross sections, storm water management, trails & sidewalks and etc. Developers must abide by these requirements regardless of the zone. Beyond that, with most commercial development the City requires a Conditional Use Permit in which the City Council can impose reasonable conditions on a proposed project to mitigate the detrimental effects of the proposed use in accordance with applicable standards set forth in our Zoning Ordinance. The final tool that the City has available is the Development Agreement that documents the commitments made by both the developer and the City and the resulting obligations on both sides. The Development Agreement can once again help to insure that the proposed quality of a project becomes the final result.

The proposed development of the State Institutional and Trust Lands (SITLA) parcel south of Mesa Vista Drive in Padre Canyon Estates raised widespread concern. The developer proposed dramatic changes to the existing Land Use and Zoning to create a high density resort complex in an area not intended for that use. The situation was complicated by the fact that SITLA is a State institution, thus the land is State owned and technically not under the jurisdiction of the City. Fortunately SITLA has chosen to follow the usual City approval process and has reached an agreement with the developer of the adjacent Black Desert Resort to redesign and significantly change the character of the proposed development on their parcel.


Recently Vista Charter School announced their intent to build an intermediate school on property adjacent to their existing facility. They made an offer on a fifteen acre parcel owned by the City to presumably facilitate their acquisition of the parcel on which they hope to build. With prob-

lematic traffic issues already associated with the existing school red flags have been raised at the thought of another four hundred students arriving and departing from that same area. The challenge to the City on this development is that by State Law a school, including a charter school, can be built in any zone meaning basically anywhere. They are subject to at least some of the City Development Ordinances and Design Guidelines and will be required to conduct a traffic study to demonstrate that they have a solution for that problem since it impacts public health and safety, but even if every Council Member opposed the project it could not be denied.

The newest proposed development causing resistance is "Canyon Crossing" at the intersection of Snow Canyon Parkway and Snow Canyon Drive. A concept plan application has been filed and a basic layout presented to both the Planning Commission and City Council. Most of the opposition centers on allowing a gas station, convenience store and a row of retail shops on that piece of ground. The problem is that the parcel is zoned Resort Commercial and the Table of Uses for that zone allows all three. So once again even if every City Council Member opposed the development it cannot be denied and because an application has been filed, by law neither the zone nor its associated requirements can be changed as they apply to the current application.

The City can however control to an extent the project design through its existing Development Ordinances and Design Guidelines that exclude "strip" type design and govern lighting, signage and landscaping. A Conditional Use Permit and a Development Agreement provide further means of mitigating perceived negative impacts. Hopefully this will result in a quality project like exists in places like Scottsdale Arizona whose design requirements for gas stations and convenience stores was sent to me by a thoughtful resident and forwarded to the developer with a personal appeal from me to respect the extraordinary beauty and character of Ivins City and the importance of that corner to all of our residents.

The assumption that the City Council can legislate anything anytime to resist development is incorrect. The time to weigh in on what we as residents want to have in the way of development and where we want to have it is when the Land Use & Zoning Maps and Zoning & Development Ordinances are under review. Unfortunately we rarely receive much public comment when that occurs. As a result when development applications are received and the approval process commences some of you may become upset and often our hands are tied.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

200 West and Highway 91 Sewer Improvement Project: A sewer line is being installed along 200 West (from 400 South to Highway 91) and along Highway 91 (from 600 West to 400 West). The sewer line along 200 West will be installed within the existing asphalt while the sewer line along Highway 91 will be installed along the northern side of the roadway shoulder. The sewer installation along 200 West will disrupt traffic, so expect some detours in the vicinity. Work is anticipated to begin towards the beginning of September.

2019 Storm Water Improvements Project: Several storm water related projects are anticipated to begin in October of this year. There will be three locations where the majority of the work will take place. The first location is on 200 South, between 100 West and Main Street. The storm drain pipe will be installed within the existing asphalt and will disrupt traffic. The second location is along Highway 91, from 600 West down to the Kayenta Wash. The majority of this work will take place along the northern shoulder of the roadway. The third location is along Kwavasa Drive, from 450 North down to the Kayenta Wash. The majority of the work will be along the shoulder, but the roadway within this section will be relocated, causing disruption and road closures in this section of roadway.

The General Election will be held on Tuesday, November 5, 2019. All Municipal Elections will be administered through the Washington County Clerk's Office and will be Vote-by-Mail. The official Vote Center for Ivins City is the Santa Clara Branch Library located at 1099 Lava Flow Drive, St. George, Utah. Ivins City Hall, located at 55 North Main Street in Ivins, is a Ballot Assistance Center where you may drop off your ballot. If you are registered to vote and reside in Ivins as your primary residence and voting location, you will receive a ballot in the mail. You can verify that you are a registered voter by going to www.vote.utah.gov and FIND my voter registration info. You can then verify on TRACK MY BALLOT, that the County has a ballot that is being prepared for you. Ballots for the General Election will be mailed out through the Washington County Clerk's Office between October 15th and October 22nd, 2019.

PLEASE NOTE: You may vote for UP TO three (3) candidates – per the Washington County Clerk's Office, **IF YOU VOTE FOR MORE THAN THREE (3) CANDIDATES, YOUR VOTE WILL NOT BE COUNTED** because it is an over-vote.

There will be a **CANDIDATE FORUM held on Thursday, October 10, 2019 at Ivins City Hall from 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.** The forum is organized and sponsored by a third-party Community Action Committee. 


Improving Nighttime Health & Safety

The Ivins City Council took groundbreaking action in August on what we believe to be the lead nationally in dramatically improving nighttime health and safety for Ivins residents with changes to its outdoor lighting ordinance.

The city now requires that the maximum color temperature for all new outdoor non-residential lighting is 3,000 degrees Kelvin, down from 4,000. More importantly, these new lights will be required to add amber filters that eliminate almost all the blue light emitted by LEDs. Outdoor lighting for new residential development will be limited to no more than 2,700 degrees Kelvin.

What's the big deal?

- Blue light rays have short wavelengths just above ultraviolet light. We know ultraviolet light is harmful. It burns. That's why we wear sunscreen. We're learning that too much blue light can also be harmful.
- The blue part of the light spectrum creates most of the glare we see. Glare constricts your pupils, diminishing your eyes' ability to adapt to low-light conditions, like nighttime.
- Scientists are just beginning to understand the negative impacts on health, including blue light's contribution to cardiovascular disease, metabolic and immunological disorders, obesity, cancer, macular degeneration, glaucoma, and more
- And blue light is disruptive to plants, animals, crop pollination and more

Water Pressures

One of the most common phone calls we receive in the Water Department is the concern of a resident that noticed that they don't have the same amount of pressure that they are used to and they are wondering what happened. In this article, I'd like to explain how water pressure works in our water system to help someone that might be experiencing a similar problem.

Since our City is on a hillside, in most parts of the city, we have substantial amount of pressure in the main water pipes with as much as 130 psi (pounds per square inch) in a few extreme locations. The further away from the Red Mountain, the more likely you are to have increased pressures. We design the system to keep a minimum pressure of 40 psi during normal operation, 30 psi during peak usage and 20 psi during a fire event.

Home plumbing is generally not designed to handle pressures over 80 psi, therefore plumbing code requires that all homes be fitted with a pressure regulator sometimes called a pressure reducing valve (PRV). This valve protects your home from high pressures in our water system.

Everyone should know where their pressure regulator is located. If you don't, the first place to look is the garage, the second place to look is near your water heater (which still might be in the garage). Usually it is accompanied by a main shutoff valve that you need to repair your plumbing.

About 95 percent of the time that we receive a complaint of low pressure, the problem is fixed by adjusting the pressure regulator. I have provided an image of the valve above. To adjust, you must loosen the locking nut and then twist the screw clockwise to increase pressure and counter-clockwise to reduce pressure.

The valves come preset to 50 psi, but over time they often need adjustment as they age to keep the same pressure. If you want to know what pressure you have on the home, you can attach a \$10 pressure gauge to a hose bib connected to the house and watch the pressure adjust with the twisting of the screw.



WATER WISDOM

Help the City reach its goal to reduce water use by 10% over the next 10 years.

Outdoor Tip: Use a mulching mower that leaves the clippings in the grass, this cools the ground and hold moisture.
