TIME TO REVIEW Article by: Chris Hart, Mayor

The City has begun the process of reviewing our with the Planning General Plan Commission commencing discussions on the Land Use Map, a critical component of the General Plan that illustrates the City's vision for future development and serves as the principLE guide for changes in zoning throughout the City. The current Land Use Map shows large areas of the City as very low density. That is reflected on the Zoning Map for example as a RA-1 or RA-5 zone (Residential Agricultural minimum lot size 1 or 5 acres). These areas were created on the recommendation of Bruce Parker, a consultant the City hired several years ago to assist us in amending our General Plan.



His idea was to identify these areas on the Zoning Map as "holding zones" giving the City the best opportunity to manage future growth and keep development consistent with the vision in the General Plan as applications for zone changes were received.

These "holding zones" have proven to be a source of confusion through the years as residents' expectations have solidified around them fostering the belief that much of the City would in fact be restricted to lot sizes of an acre or more. Nice as that would be it is simply impractical from a development standpoint given the cost of land and would allow only the most affluent to live here. So the dilemma has been for the Planning Commission and City Council to make zoning decisions based on the "intent" of the Land Use Plan taking into consideration the lack of clarity created by a Zoning Map replete with "holding zones."

One of the problems with the current Zoning Map with its very low density "holding zones" is that population projections that form the basis of studies conducted to determine future transportation utility needs are required to be based on current zoning. An artificially low population projection could result in infrastructure decisions and completed systems installations ultimately proving to be inadequate as the City continues to grow and those "holding zones" are changed to more practical alternatives.

The Planning Commission has currently been tasked with reviewing both the Land Use Plan and ultimately the Zoning Map and providing recommendations to the City Council to establish more clarity. That process will include Public Hearings at both the Planning Commission and City Council levels to receive your input concerning those clarifications. We also plan to conduct less formal meetings to discuss this and other upcoming issues beginning with our annual Neighborhood Meetings that will be held on January 11, 12 and 13 in our new City Hall beginning at 7:00 PM.

When the review of the Land Use and Zoning Maps is completed, it's time for the General Plan to undergo a general review. Once again that process will begin with the Planning Commission discussing it section by section and making recommendations to the City Council. Again, the process will include a number of public hearings and additional informal meetings to hear your thoughts concerning any changes. We invite you to be active participants in this process. This is the best time to have your views heard regarding the future of our community. Too often frustrated residents come forward to voice opposition to a specific issue or project that has been entitled through existing zoning or other City Ordinances that simply can't be disregarded relative to that specific issue or project once an application has been filed.

Our General Plan is the guiding document for virtually all decisions made by the City Council. It has moved us forward in a positive way for at least the last twenty years. The General Plan is, however, a "living document" designed to be updated as circumstances and values change over time. The review process for the General Plan is highly detailed and very time consuming. It will likely take this entire year and even longer to complete it and adopt an amended version of it. We look forward to hearing from you either in person or by email as the process unfolds. It's our community after all and ought to become what we together agree it should be in the future.


Santa Visit for Kindergartners

Public Works

Only Rain in Drain

We all want our rivers and lakes to be clean and not full of trash, oils, and other chemicals that make them less desirable. Water that goes into the street gutter will go straight to the Santa Clara River and eventually Lake Mead totally untreated. We do not want our rivers and lakes to become polluted. Please help.

Here are some things that you can do:

- Sweep up your concrete surfaces such as your driveway and sidewalks, don't hose them off.
- Wash your car at a carwash or if you do wash at home, try to do it in an area where the wash water will absorb into the ground rather than go into the gutter.
- **Do not overwater your landscaping**. This water will deliver contaminants straight to the river especially if you are using too much fertilizers and pesticides.
- Dispose of batteries, oils, chemicals and paints and other potentially hazardous chemicals properly. See the county landfill website, www.wcsw.org, for information on proper disposal. Most chemicals are best to be used up for its intended purpose, but if you must dispose of something a perfect opportunity is available in the Spring (usually March) and Fall (usually September) at the Washington County Landfill on the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day. Go to wcsw.org to get up to date information. The landfill will take your household hazardous waste for free.
- **Keep our community clean of litter and trash.** Don't be afraid to pick up trash even if it isn't yours. Pick up your pet waste and dispose; that is the law. There are several community programs to help us keep the City clean:



• As part of the **Community Cleanup Program**, the City provides dumpsters at the City Yard, 460 N and 100 W, next to the Cemetery at least one Saturday per month and sometimes two Saturdays. Use these opportunities to keep your yard and the community clean. Go to www.ivins.com to get the dates for 2021.

The **Adopt-a-Block** Program is a program where individuals, families, neighbors, or service groups may sign up to act as a steward over a part of the streets. Signup today to become an official Adopt-A-Block member. Call the Public Works Department at 435-634-0689.
