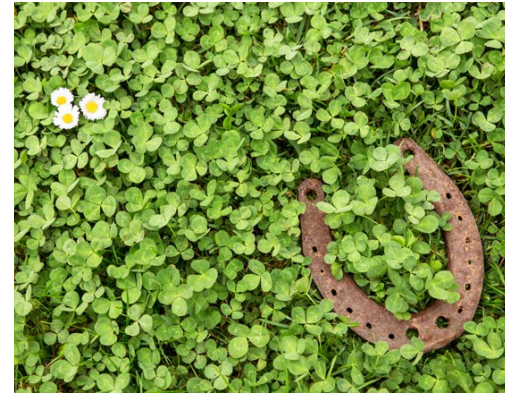

It couldn't have been a more perfect venue with its sophisticated AV system that included desk mounted microphones distributed throughout the two auditorium classrooms that we occupied.

I further want to thank the panel of experts that prepared information and sacrificed their time to be with us that evening. They included Council Members Mike Scott and Lance Anderson, our City Engineer and Public Works Director Chuck Gillette, the General Manager of the Washington County Water Conservancy District Zach Renstrom, the Vice President of Conserve Southwest Utah Ed Andrechak, Aaron Anderson from Bowens Collins Engineering and retired Dean of Engineering Wayne Pennington. I thought they all did a great job trying to explain a complex subject and answering your questions.

The presentations and my comments went longer than I'd planned leaving twenty fewer minutes for your comments and questions for which I've been rightly criticized. I apologize to you for that and promise I'll correct the problem in our future meetings. However, water is a subject that we couldn't have fully covered in a ten hour meeting much less in two. Because there was a flurry of hands raised towards the end, many of which we didn't have time to get to, I invited you to email your questions and comments to me at chart@ivins.com. That invitation remains open and I will publish some of the more noteworthy of them along with the panelists' responses in a future newsletter.

I also apologize to those of you who woke up early on Friday February 24th to watch the CNN story on water in the Southwest that I mentioned as we ended our meeting.

This one is on the subject of housing and the panelists at this point include Utah State Representative Neil Walter who is a real estate expert as well as a State Legislator in the House of Representatives, local architect, Richard Kohler AIA, Shirlyne Quayle, the Housing Strategies & Policy Director for St George City and current head of the Washington County Housing Affordability Coalition (HAC), Stacy Young, the Governmental Affairs Director for the Southern Utah Home Builders Association (SUHBA), Mike Haycock, our Director of Planning and Zoning. The panel will also include Council Member Jenny Johnson and perhaps one other Council Member. In addition I'm looking for another expert with experience in other areas of the state or beyond that have faced the growth and zoning dilemmas that we are currently facing and what solutions they came up with. If that's you please let me know.



This Talkabout will focus on ways our recent survey results can be implemented in Ivins City or in some cases perhaps cannot be. We'll touch on State Law and requirements governing housing including those focused on moderate and low income housing, options on the appearance and density of that type of housing, the struggle we have providing housing for essential service providers and for those who will need to be employed by our developing resorts, and what we ought to be doing to prepare and zone for our future growth. Water Conservation Works

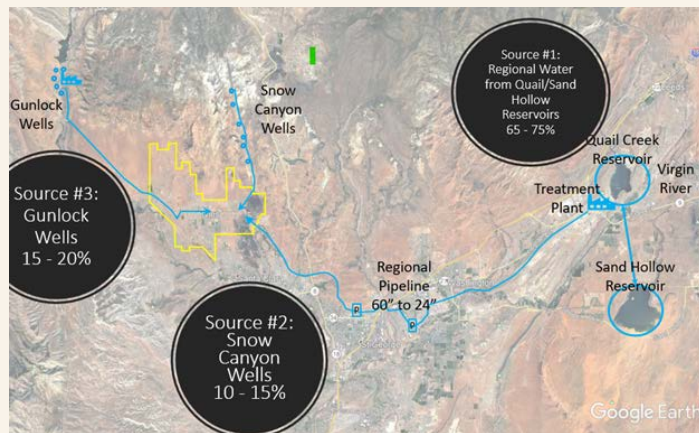

Ivins used an average of 60 million gallons of water a month over the past twelve months. Based on our population growth since 2005, we would be using over 70 million gallons a month now. Conservation works. And we're just getting started. We didn't have any "tools" to use to help with conservation for most of those 18 years. We do now. The Washington County Water Conservancy District started offering rebates for grass removal a few months ago. They also provide rebates for installing smart irrigation controllers and switching to WaterSense-labeled toilets. See www.wcwc.org for more information.

Where Does Our Water Come From?

Water seems to be the topic everyone is most concerned about. We just held the Water Talkabout a few days ago, where Mayor Hart moderated a discussion on the current water situation. I shared a brief presentation showing where our water comes from. For those of you that missed the presentation, I thought I would share the following map from the presentation.



The graphic shows a map of Ivins City (in yellow) compared to our three current sources of water which are:

1. Regional water from the Virgin River via Quail Creek Reservoir and/or Sand Hollow Reservoir then through the Quail Creek Reservoir Water Treatment Plant. After traveling through a 15 mile pipeline, this represents 65 to 75 percent of the water we receive.
2. Snow Canyon Wells are a group of wells that are jointly owned by Ivins, Santa Clara and St George. We currently get 10 to 15 percent of our water from this source.
3. Gunlock Wells are a group of wells that are owned by the City of St George. We have an agreement for St George to provide a portion of that water to our City. We receive 15 to 20 percent of our water from this source.

Since 25 to 35 percent of our water is from groundwater sources, it turns out to be "hard water" meaning that it contains a lot of calcium carbonate. Anyone that doesn't have a water softener would know that, seeing how our water can ruin a dishwasher or scum up a shower pretty quickly.

Another disadvantage of groundwater is that this water also contains a tiny amount of arsenic. We work really hard to keep the arsenic levels below the EPA maximum contaminate level which is 10 parts per billion (as a running annual average). The City of St George has installed an arsenic removal treatment plant up close to Gunlock Wells and the Washington County Water Conservancy District has also installed one near wells around Sand Hollow Reservoir to combat this contaminant.

Other than arsenic and water hardness, our water quality is good as it meets all regulations. We maintain a small amount of chlorine in the water that ensures that there is no bacterial contamination. We test for bacteria contamination every week taking 144 samples per year. Our lead and copper samples that we take every three years have always come back much below the contaminant limits.

We test for dozens more contaminants, and all are below the maximum contaminate levels set by the EPA. Any test that is more than zero are published in our Annual Water Quality Report that is mailed to every resident and is available on ivins.com.

Ivins City History

In celebration of the 100 year settlement of Ivins I am sharing with you some of the stories about the original pioneer families of Ivins. For the next 12 months I will be putting a spotlight on each of the families and their accomplishments. I hope you enjoy reading about them as much as I have. I want to thank Emma Fife who wrote "History of The Santa Clara Bench - Ivins Our Home Beneath the Red Mountain", Kay and Ellen Ence who wrote "Lillie and Milo Ence Pioneer Stalwarts", The Washington County Historical Society, and the website Familysearch.org where I am able to read and learn about all these wonderful pioneers. - Cherise

Reuben and Mata Ence were the seventh family to move to Ivins with one son and one daughter in February 1924. Reuben was on the Town Board, the Water Board, and was Water Master for many years. Mata and Reuben worked very hard to earn a living and raise their family. Mata worked beside her husband in any work he had to do. They made part of their living by hauling wood from the mountains. They would go to the mountains and cut the logs, then have the horses drag them to the wagons. When they had sufficient for a full load, they loaded them on the wagons and delivered the wood to customers. Reuben had a magnificent team of horses and with this team he helped build the canal, reservoir, roads, along with taking care of his own properties.



Some would say they were the greatest team of horses in all of Utah. Of course, if you ask his brother Milo Ence they were the second greatest. They also raised garden produce of many varieties. This was all very hard work, but they enjoyed working together which helped to form very close family ties. Their daughter Lillis wrote, "Every morning, the men and women would water and feed the cows and milk them. The women and children would drive the cows to their fields out of town to let them graze. In the afternoon, we would drive them back home to feed, water and be milked. It was very useful to have our own milk, cream, and butter. The extra was sold in five-gallon cans to the St. George creamery. Each family had chickens for eggs and meat, and some to sell." My father, Reuben Ence, was the water master for years. He did a real good job of keeping water in town. His job was running up to Shem, day or night, to follow the water and keep it in the ditches. Our mothers worked right along with our dads, doing everything they could. They washed by hand on a washboard, then put the clothes in a tub of hot water, boiling them so they would come clean. They made their own soap, using cracklings from pork, sheep and beef fat and lye. This was the best soap! It really cleaned the clothes and kept them beautiful and white." Water Master comes with a high amount of responsibility especially in this community where there are no natural rivers or springs flowing onto the bench. Reuben always had to keep the water flowing. In January 1927, it was a particularly cold winter and the ice got so heavy that the framework gave way in the flume and a large section of the canal went down. This caused the water to flow out of the canal and no longer into Ivins. This was serious because the people in Ivins relied entirely on the water from the canal for everything. It was decided that it would be best to try siphoning the water across and it proved to be satisfactory.

However, the very next winter was another severe one and the ice coming down was a threat to their flume across the Dry Wash. Two sections of the canal did go and so it meant more hard work, more expense, and more worry if it would happen to them again. All the men worked long hours to get the water back into the canal. Water for the Ivins Bench was and has always been of big concern for those living here.

While wrestling with water issues, they were, at the same time, having to deal with the Great Depression. The depression turned out to be a blessing for the Ivins community. The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) created by President Roosevelt put people to work. Luther Winsor was the driving force behind the building of a new dam. For that reason, it was named after him. In one of his letters we read: "It was about 1933. The town of Ivins was in need of a diversion dam that would be permanent and one that would provide a means of keeping silt out of their canal and reservoir." This was a great relief to the people of Ivins because it helped eliminate the possibility of their flumes being washed out by the ice like previous years.



Reuben and Mata Ence had six children, five would grow to adulthood. They all have shared great memories of growing up in Ivins. Even with all the hard work came joy too. One such memory they all share is their Dad dressing up like Santa Clause every Christmas Eve giving out presents to all the children in Ivins after the Christmas Program and singing Christmas carols. Reuben and Mata loved living in Ivins and lived there for the rest of their lives. Their daughter Lillis wrote about them after their passing, "Our parents had the same faith, determination and perseverance as their parents and grandparents, who were the pioneers of Santa Clara. They taught us to be industrious, honest, dependable, obedient and unselfish. They had integrity and set the example of caring and sharing. We owe them a great debt of gratitude, which we can repay only by passing on these sterling traits to our children and grandchildren. This town will thrive and grow if these sterling traits are continued."

CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

Highway 91 Project: The HWY 91 project began early February. To date, they've been working on the sewer near Kwavasa Drive and on the clearing of the roadway shoulders from about 200 East to 400 West.

The project generally entails resurfacing the roadway, adding a center landscape median, adding bikelanes to HWY 91 from 200 East to Kwavasa, adding a 11' wide pedestrian trail on the north side of HWY 91 from 200 East to Fire Lake Park, and the construction of two roundabouts located at 400 West and Kwavasa. There will also be some utility improvements as well as intersection improvements at 200 West and Main Street.

Anticipate mild to moderate disruption along HWY 91 continuing until August.

It is anticipated that the roadways and roundabouts will be done in segments. Below are the general segments and the anticipated work timeline:

Road Segment 1 – 200 East to 400 West – late February to late April (about 55 days)

Road Segment 2 – 400 West Roundabout – mid April to early June (about 40 days)

Road Segment 3 – 400 West to Kwavasa – early June to early July (about 30 days)

Road Segment 4 – Kwavasa Roundabout – early May to mid June (about 40 days)

A final asphalt overlay of all road segments, between 200 East and Kwavasa, is anticipated to done in July.

The trails are also anticipated to be done in segments, below are the general segments and the anticipated work timeline:

Trail Segment 1 – 200 East to Main Street – early February to early March (20 days)

Trail Segment 2 – Main Street to 400 West – late February to late March (30 days)

Trail Segment 3 – 400 West Roundabout – late February to early April (35 days)

Trail Segment 4 – 400 West to Kwavasa – late March to late April (30 days)

Trail Segment 5 – Kwavasa to Kayenta Parkway – early April to late May (50 days)

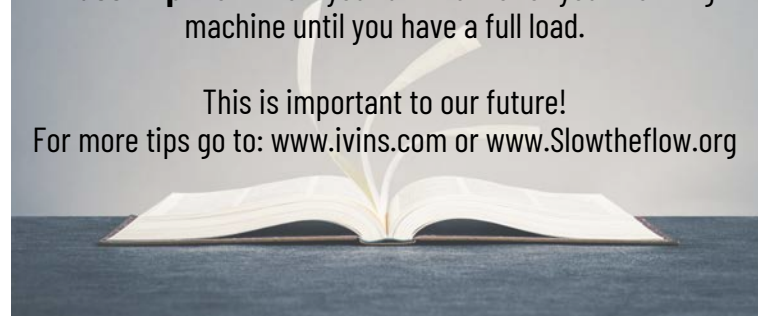

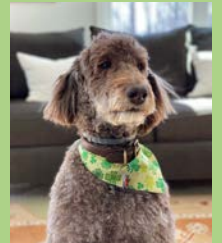
